



If you had to take one selection from the Bible, it's a very difficult challenge, but if you had to take one, I think that does a pretty good job of summarizing it.

And it went back and forth and they bantered back and forth and finally she said, "What's this all about?"

"Well, daddy said to us yesterday, 'When Grandma croaks, we'll all go to Europe."

That is not one of Sidney Thurston's jokes, by the way, much too mild.

In a very real sense, I think we stand today on a threshold in the history of this organization which can truly be called

Let us follow that lead.

Let the greater good, let the common good be our guiding light as we follow the Lord's direction into the next century.

Are you just waiting to retire or do you want to serve God's people by serving the Fire Department of your community? You can't be a leader unless you're a servant, that's why the pope is officially called the servant of the servants of God. May God give all of us a great dose of the power of positive thinking as the next year enfolds before us. And as the turn of the century

Come to my assistance." Do you ever think of that when you are dealing with politicians, the city manager or the Board of Selectmen? They rarely agree with you but you do your homework with God on your side and oh, you'll be amazed what can happen. "He redeems your life of destruction. Bless the Lord, O my soul."

And in conclusion, one further reminder of what wonders you can accomplish in your departments is found in Philippians 4,13, Chapter 4, Verse 13 of Philippians:

May all our deliberations and discussions result in what is for the common good of this Association and for the fire service of New England at large. Bless all those who are about to take office and keep them loyal to you and to the guidelines of our Association. One God forever and ever. Amen.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: I would like to call on Chief John Kyle from Marlborough for an address of welcome.

Chief Wehter for the Secretary's report.

CHIEF RICHARD K. WEHTER: [Hingham, MA] To the Officers and members of the New England Association of Fire Chiefs, Incorporated, I herewith submit the report of the Secretary for the Fiscal Year ending May 31, 1996.

The Officers, Directors, and Committee members have held several meetings throughout the year in preparation for the Conference. Full Board meetings were held in August, September, January, and April. These meeting were held in the Royal Plaza Hotel in Marlborough, Massachusetts and the October meeting was held at the Westin Hotel in Providence, Rhode Island. Several subcommittee meetings also were held

throughout the year.

Testimonials and Memorials were attended by various officers and directors of the Association.

The day-to-day business of the Association was handled by the President and Secretary/Treasurer and all correspondence was answered or directed to the appropriate committee. The Secretary edited and prepared the Red Book for printing, prepared all conference forms, advertisements, and the conference pocket program. All mailings were prepared by the Secretary with help as may be required.

For monetary reasons ARA Human Factors has elected not to hold the Combat Challenge at our Conference.

The Joint Conference Committee met three times during the year and again at this Conference on Sunday. The committees of both Associations agree that the trial period should be for two years. An evaluation of the membership of the New England Division revealed that only 49 percent belonged to the New England Association of Fire Chiefs. This is in sharp contrast to the generally popular belief. It has been generally agreed that the first day of the Conference, Saturday, would be known as Division Day. The Division would have their meeting and elections and possibly a luncheon or join us at the Annual Banquet. Division officers would be sworn in or at least recognized at the Annual Banquet. The Division will appoint one member to attend the NEAFC Board meetings and act as liaison for the Division. Many details are yet to be worked out. Interest has been indicated by the New England Fire Apparatus Mechanics Association in also joining our Conference. This would be an excellent addition to the Conference, adding a wide range of seminars and exhibitors. It also means additional work for the Association.

During the past year the Association welcomed 47 new members, mourned the loss of 15 members, dropped 56 members for non-payment of dues, one member resigned, and seven

members were dropped as their addresse is unknown. 10 members were accorded Honorary Life status. Membership statistics as of 6/18/96 are:

Chief Mooney appointed Retired Chief Otis C. Wyatt, Jr. to the position of Historian and Reverend Foley and Reverend Chalk were re-appointed Chaplains.

In closing, I would like to thank all the Board members for their suppot and cooperation throughout he year, with special thanks to Chief Mooney, Chief Winslow, Chief Maurais, and with extra special thanks to my wife Sally and daughters Kerry, Molly, Sara, and Tracy for their patience and help in preparing the many bulk mailings and Conference packages.

It has been an honor to serve as your Secretary for these past four years and hope

to do so for many to come.

Once again this year's expenses exceeded our receipts due to the loss of advertising income. During the year the Board

of Directors discussed this matter at length. It was agreed and so voted to increase the exhibitor booth space by \$50.00 to at least cover the cost of the Red Book. Other measures which will help control costs are the elimination of the Combat Challenge, reduction to the minimum specified scholarship awards, expanded advertising in the conference pocket program, increasing the conference registration while still subsidizing the Banquet and Theme Night by \$5.00 a ticket and still providing gifts for the members and their spouses. The Board is committed to ensure a budget balance that will provide us a conference default.

All checks received by the corporation are photocopied and filed. All moneys are deposited on a daily basis in a supersaver account with minimum balances maintained in the checking account to ensure the maximum receipt of interest.

All financial records of the corporation are reviewed and subject to a full audit if receipts exceed \$100,000.00 by an outside accountant on an annual basis. His findings and a copy of all the expense and receipt records have been given to the Audit Committee for review. All members of the Audit Committee receive periodic updates on the financial conditions of the Association which ensures continuity and the ability to question any and all expenditures.

At the recommendation of the 1994 Annual Meeting the Treasurer continues to be bonded for the sum of \$200,000.00.

It has been an honor and pleasure to serve as your Secretary/Treasurer these past four years and I hope to do so for many more.

The Historian's report. Otie.
RET. CHIEF OTIS C. WYATT, JR.:
[Narragansett, RI] Yes, sir. Report of the Historian to the New England Association of Fire Chiefs.

During the past year, with a great deal of help from Retired Chief Merton Dyer of New Hampshire, your historians have:

Number 1. Solicited via the Secretary's notices the aid of any member who may have in his possession any old Red Books or know of anyone who may have them. Mrs. Brennan of Salem, Mass., the wife of our past Secretary some years ago, has given to me the books of her late husband, former Secretary Jim Brennan. I have also heard from Murray Young of Massachusetts. He brought the books in yesterday to the Conference and we have 1935, '6, '7, '8 and '42.

Merton Dyer received some books just this afternoon starting at 1924, 1927, '28. So the request is working. I would note that 1924 is the oldest book that we know of and we don't even know if there was one in 1923, but the first Annual Meeting of the organization was in 1923.

Number 2. As reported last year, Mert Dyer, Secretary Richard Wehter, and I will attempt to accumulate as many Red Books as may be available, one for each one held. And we found another complete set except for one with Harold Roeder.

Number 3. Mert Dyer and I respectfully suggest to the Board of Directors that there be provided in each subsequent Red Book some space to briefly describe this Association and its history as it existed at

the time of the Conference 25 years ago, 50 years ago, and after next year, 75 years ago -- much of this information will be derived from the past Red Books. We also have some members and vendors of many years of service. We have tried to keep track and find out exactly about the 50 years of being a constant and consistent vendor to us and certainly those that have been members with us in their retirement and before.

In this search, Mert found articles from 1925, for instance, when one of the main topics of discussion at that Conference was how the fire services are going to address the problems of oil burners. And in 1937, the only known female Fire Chief in the country from Rhode Island gave a talk before this group on how aircraft might aid the fire service in brush fires. That was 1937, some 57 years ago.

We are well-aware that all of our history that is interesting could not possibly be reprinted in the Red Books due to space and cost limitations. Both of us wanted the matter to come before the body to determine the sentiment of the body and to then determine how best to prepare for any historical report that may be desired.

Number 4. We strongly feel that some type of printed certificate or citation, suitable for framing, should be made annually and given to the James L. Grote Scholarship recipients. I have a sample we've worked out for this Conference with the officers, the President, and the Secretary. Mert and I have come up with this and this would be a standard form of which the names would just be entered each year. Our Secretary has a formal certificate and we we would put it in a binder, of which this would be on one side and the certificate on the other to the recipients.

This says:

"New England Association of Fire Chiefs, Inc.

"1996 Conference & Exposition June 22 - 26, 1996, Marlborough, MA.

" Chief James L. Grote Scholarship Award.

"The New England Association of Fire Chiefs was organized on July 12, 1922 for the purpose of promoting the education and needs of the Fire Service in New England. Since that time many members have served the fire service with dedication and distinction. Chief James L. Grote of Chester, Connecticut was one of those chiefs.

"Chief Grote was an active member of the fire service for over 80 years. He served as Chief and Fire Marshal of the Chester Fire Department for 46 years and Fire Marshal for or an additional 24 years, until his death at age 100 in 1992. He also served as President of the New England Association of Fire Chiefs in 1967 and was active in the fire service in Connecticut, New England, and on the national level.

"Therefore it is fitting that this scholarship is presented in the name of Chief James L. Grote to encourage the education of our young people and honor our longtime friend, member and colleague.

"This scholarship is presented this 25th day of June 1996 to: " -- and there's one for each of the recipients.

And finally in my report, this report is in keeping with the direction I received from the Board of Directors and the President concerning appointing an Historian for this Association. In dealing with the present and future problems of the fire service, we cannot and should not forget the past. Thank you.

CHIEF JOHN P. JENKINS: [West Barnstable, MA] Second.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: Any discussion?
All in favor to reconsider, say Aye.
[Aye]
Opposed?
[No]
It's open for discussion.

RET. CHIEF OTIS C. WYATT, JR.: tried to evaluate what I received in the mail. I would want the membership to know the Bylaw Committee had a discussion of this bylaw Sunday morning at 8 o'clock. Chief John Obier of Connecticut and myself from Rhode Island were the only people there other than people associated with the bylaws that did not seem to generate much interest to find out why the bylaw was proposed and is the perception that some people have real or imagined. My problem that I see in the whole reconsideration bit and what I've heard in discussion of being out in the exhibit hall for the entire Conference, not in other places, not up in the Hospitality Room talking in corners because I don't think it was really discussed, but the people that have come around and asked, "What is it about" or "Why are we doing it," and so forth.

I would want to put forth Otie
Wyatt's personal observation of what's
happened. It doesn't make a tinker's damn
what you people voted or how your state voted,
that's not what I am referring to. I am
referring to Otie Wyatt's personal opinion
only. There is a perception that at this time
this Association is proposing to make a change
to the bylaw that was defeated some few years
ago solely so that an individual may be
eligible next year to continue in the position
of Secretary/Treasurer. Bylaws in and of
themselves should only be changed for reasons,
not for people.

The Bylaw Committee under Carl Winslow very carefully explained to John Obier and I and anybody else who wants to listen, that because of the extensive operation that is expected to take place at Eastern State next year and with the further enhancement of the Mechanics may come in, that the job has now grown to an extent that an active Chief

doing his Chiefly duties would not be in a position to adequately do the Secretary/Treasurer's job on a part-time position. I have no personal information to know that is so or not so, but I can tell you this organization has grown in my 30 years with it one hell of a lot and it is probably very close, if not already beyond, the capacity of a part-time position.

whether this is accepted or rejected, is that if you reject it and with the knowledge that our Secretary is retiring in three months, which makes him completely eligible to be Secretary this coming year or makes him completely ineligible to be Secretary next year. Who among the active Chiefs has the ability and the time to do what he is currently doing? And should he not be able and should no active Chief step forward, you have one large joint conference with no way of running the most important office.

We pay high tribute to our President. Our President does one hell of a job and all the presidents have that come up through the ranks, but having been Secretary/Treasurer of probably a dozen different organizations, there is no doubt in my mind that the most important person in the hierarchy of any organization is the Secretary/Treasurer. They bring the continuity to the office -- and I am not addressing this Secretary/Treasurer -- I'm addressing the position of Secretary/Treasurer.

If some of you have problems with our present Secretary/Treasurer, you should make it known to him and see what can be done. If not, when an opportunity comes up and there is an election, you have a chance to show it.

But I just think our organization of some \$106,000 in receipts, if I recall that Treasurer's report correctly, is a pretty big organization and I don't think it is something you can run rinky-dink. I think you should think about it. I am not questioning the vote. You can vote the way you want but if you don't do it this year, you may very well

find you have to do it next year before you can even find a candidate for Secretary, be it Dick Wehter, be it some other honorable member or some Chief. And I am strong that if a Chief has the qualifications and wants to do it, he should go before a retired guy. But maybe you are getting big enough that a retired guy should do it. But I am saying what came to me across three days in chitchatting with at least half of the people in here and another half that came in on a daily basis that are not here. I'm just passing it for your information.

FROM THE FLOOR: I would just like to bring out that the job of Secretary/Treasurer is very important. I can remember back in the days of my good friend Jim Brennan and he put this organization in good shape but he put an awful lot of time in it and I am sure Jim would love to be here today and take care of this position because it is not a job on a part-time basis. It is a big job and you have a big organization here and it is very important and I hope everyone will consider that.

CHIEF DAVID SYLVARIA: [Bristol, Rhode Island] This here has come up repeatedly that I can remember. Like all the other officers in this Association, it has to go to an active Chief. I'm a firm believer that all the officers should be active Chiefs. I think at this point opening it up could be a mistake. Why don't we wait and see if someone has to retire because they are no longer going to be an active Chief, why don't we wait and see if anyone else is interested in the active ranks. To turn around and say maybe no one is interested is kind of premature. I think if someone has to retire, the opportunity should be at least given to an active Chief and at that point, if no one wants it, we can change the bylaws in the appropriate manner if need I don't think we should change that ahead of time.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: I will make one comment. Nobody ran against Dick today, so. CHIEF CARL H. WINSLOW: [Yarmouth,

ME] Mr. President, that sounds all well and good and I appreciate your comments. If you get here next year to West Springfield and your current Secretary is retiring, no question about that, no one's fooling anybody and everyone knows that, you get out there and you can't change the bylaws, it's too late. You are going to have to find an active Chief and I can tell you I stepped into that position as President going from Marty to Dick. I'm telling you it was one hell of a miserable year for the President doing that. It's an impossible situation to do it that quickly.

I think what we are doing today is to change the bylaw to make it available. It doesn't mean when you go up to Springfield and have your Annual Meeting that an active Chief can't run and win, but what it does mean is the retired Chief cannot. So what you are doing is limiting your choice next year, period. I think you are asking for some real problems. You heard the Treasurer's report and we are talking of \$200,000 that this man handles whether it's Dick or whether it's somebody else. This organization has grown tremendously since the small time I've been actively involved and I think we have to move forward.

RET. CHIEF MERTON S. DYER:
[Peterborough, NH] I spent a lot of time
working with Jim Brennan when he was Secretary
and I know the amount of work and it certainly
has increased a lot since that time. I fully
support what Carl said that by voting for the
bylaw change, you are not saying it has to be.
You are giving yourselves another option. If
you want to use it in another year, you may
run into a position where you will want to use
it. I think it would be wise to have that
option in the bylaws.

CHIEF PARKER: I'm a newcomer to your organization as I am a newcomerer to the state. I've seen this type of visionary process going on in other organizations and to not afford yourselves the opportunity to have the latitude to go either way I think would be

a mistake. If you want to build it in that an active Chief or it's an election or whatever you do, don't limit your options. I think you'd be hurting yourselves.

As the chairman of the Bylaw Committee said, next year is too late and you'd be going down hard by the bough and trying to catch up. Again, our President noted no one ran against him this year. It's not a job that people are just dying to get. There's an extreme amount of work in that and Chief Wehter does an extremely good job. Whoever the person is is not the point here. For me the point is and I implore you not to limit your options and this is when you have to open your options. Next year is absolutely too late.

CHIEF JAMES: [West Warwick, RI] Can the bylaw be amended where an active Chief does not want the position and it could go to the present retired position?

PRESIDENT MOONEY: Well, I think, we discussed that and the problem with that is I think if someone is going to run against any officer in this organization they should make it known at least three months before the Conference. I don't think someone should come out on the day of the Conference and say, "I am running against Dick Wehter." You can't wait until the last day of the Conference for running for any office, not just the Secretary/Treasurer. I'm not saying you can't make that amendment, I'm just saying I don't see how that would work.

CHIEF FREDERICK STANLEY: [Hope
Valley, RI] I think the thing that bothers me
most is we did this with Marty and I think we
are going again. I think you should have a
committee to see what we are going to do. We
are joining two organizations together with a
lot more work for the Secretary/Treasurer and
probably a suggestion or some way to have a
Secretary/Treasurer may be it's not even a
Chief but somebody who is doing that job for
us even if we have to have somebody from
outside to do the work. It's something you
have to look at and we're going to be looking

at a lot of things in the future. I am deathly opposed to doing what you are doing. Now you defeated it and back when Marty wanted to do it and you are defeating it again and I am voting against it for the same reason I voted against it last time. It was all of a sudden thrown out because all of a sudden Marty was retiring -- nothing against Dick -- Dick's retiring and you want to change the vote

FROM THE FLOOR: Marty was not retiring, he was moving to another position.
FROM THE FLOOR: He was not going to be a Fire Chief, it's a different issue.

CHIEF STANLEY: The point is you are changing it for an individual, not for the organization. Set a committee up and change it for the organization. Maybe by next year he'll be back in there again. I've got nothing promised for that. I think you should put a committee and research it and do some work on it.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: I think that's basically what we've done and that's why the board has made this recommendation because we've studied it.

CHIEF JOHN J. FLAHERTY: [Springfield, MA] I'm in favor of the bylaw change and I expressed that to the members of the Massachusetts conference. I think that bylaw change has to be acted on at this meeting. We can't go have another committee next year, it will be too late. We won't be able to have the option of going to a retired next year. You still have an option of having an active Chief if everyone feels it should be an active Chief. You can have an active Chief and you can announce in a timely matter that they are running for the office next year, but you won't have that option if you do it now as the bylaw going in as it is now. I totally support the bylaw change and ask your support also.

REV. STEPHEN C. FOLEY: [West Hartford, CT] This has worked in Connecticut. Our Secretary and Treasurer are both retired and they're doing a wonderful job, excellent.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: Any other discussion?

O.K., we're voting.

We're not voting on it again, we're voting to see if the vote we took stands and that is only a majority. All those who took the vote the first time say Aye. Those opposed say no. Those in favor of the vote standing the first time stand up. Tony.

[Some members stood.]

PRESIDENT MOONEY: We're voting on the vote we took the first time. Those in favor of the vote the way we took it. We're voting whether the vote has to stand.

CHIEF STANLEY: It stands.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: We're voting on reconsideration.

[President Mooney and Ret. Chief Dyer conferred.]

PRESIDENT MOONEY: You voted to reconsider. Now we're voting whether the first vote you took, you wanted it to stand or not and it takes a simple majority. If you say you want it to stand, that's the end of discussion. If you don't want it to stand, then we vote on it.

FROM THE FLOOR: So we vote yes to stand.

FROM THE FLOOR: You need a two-thirds vote.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: No, a simple majority, a simple majority on this vote. If you want the original, you want the original vote that we took to stand the way it is, stand up and say yes. That's the end of the vote we already took and it was 20 to 33. It doesn't matter what it was, it was defeated. If you want --

RET. CHIEF DYER: No, no. CHIEF STANLEY: You can't do that.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: A yes vote, a yes vote will mean that you want to reconsider the vote. A no vote means that the vote we took stands.

CHIEF JOHN P. JENKINS: [West Barnstable, MA] We voted to reconsider so that vote has already been taken. I think we

take one vote.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: You can't throw the original vote out.

CHIEF JENKINS: I think you did when you voted to reconsider.

CHIEF CARL H. WINSLOW: We ask that you ask Chief Dyer to explain.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: Go ahead.

RET. CHIEF DYER: We have not voted on the reconsideration. Reconsideration was moved and seconded. There's been a lot of discussion which vote is taken away from the reconsideration question, but the main question before the body is shall we reconsider our vote. A yes vote means you want to reconsider the vote on the bylaw change. A no vote means you do not want to consider the vote. And the yes vote will give you a chance to vote again on the bylaw change. On a no vote, the 30 to 20 will stand. Does that help?

PRESIDENT MOONEY: I didn't bring it up that we're still talking about the reconsideration. Does everybody understand that?

FROM THE FLOOR: If that vote is taken, it is in the affirmative with a yes with a simple majority and the vote then to reconsider the original motion goes back to a two-thirds majority.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: You can only change the bylaws with your vote by a two-thirds majority.

All those in favor of reconsidering the vote say Aye.

[Aye]

All those opposed to reconsidering the vote say Aye.

[Aye]

It's defeated. So the original vote

FROM THE FLOOR: No. No. No. PRESIDENT MOONEY: We are back to the original bylaw change, the original motion we voted to reconsider the Article III, Section 1, at the end of the first paragraph we replace the period with a comma and add the

Secretary/ireasurer may be an Honorary Life Member.

Do I have a motion?
RET. CHIEF DYER: I move the motion.
CHIEF JENKINS: Second.
PRESIDENT MOONEY: Open for

discussion.

O.K.

CHIEF WINSLOW: The only comment I want to make is that everyone understand that we have a 60-day period in there for any bylaw change and we talk about a committe to discuss it, but we have been discussing it since we tried it in the fall and we came to the same conclusion of those involved before over the last three years, that the Association needs to move in that direction. So another committee I'm sure will come up with the same conclusion.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: Any other discussion?

REV. FOLEY: You did make it clear that this has been recommended by the Board of Directors and the committee; is that correct?

PRESIDENT MOONEY: That's correct.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: All in favor of the article change stand up.

[Some members stood.]
PRESIDENT MOONEY: Tony.

All opposed to the article change please stand up.

[Some members stood.]

PRESIDENT MOONEY: We had 54 members voting and it required 34 votes in the affirmative to pass it, two-thirds. The vote was 37 to 17 so it passes.

FROM THE FLOOR: A second vote.
PRESIDENT MOONEY: The vote passes.

Another bylaw change is the second one, which is Article V, Section 1, eliminate the second sentence.

Carl, will you explain it?
CHIEF CARL H. WINSLOW: Point of order. You said there were 34 people voting but two-thirds vote is 36. 36 required just

for the record.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: Well, we did it and on the calculator it was 34, 36, 37.

FIRE DIRECTOR SIDNEY F. THURSTON: [Waterbury Center, VT] It is back to 37.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: 37 still passes. Two-thirds of 54, three goes in to five.

[Laughter]

PRESIDENT MOONEY: 18.

FIRE DIRECTOR THURSTON: 18 times two

is 36.

CHIEF WINSLOW: You know, he is from the old school, he says, "Goes in to."

FIRE DIRECTOR THURSTON: Right. Goes in to.

CHIEF WINSLOW: Article V, Section 1 came out in the green sheet which you had mailed to you. The Bylaw Committee and the Board have felt that in this day and age there is a 10-day waiting period and we did not feel it is necessary, but as Otis mentioned, we did have a meeting of the bylaw changes a couple of days ago and during that discussing it was felt that there ought to be some waiting period but maybe 10 days was too long.

One of the things that was suggested, not that it would happen, but a possibility could be there, the perception could be there that the President and the majority of the Board could be in another altogether different meeting or conference, have a meeting and decide to do something for the Association that the other Board of Directors don't have input to.

So the Board voted today to make an amendment to that and it would read:

"Provided a 10-day notice of said meeting shall be given and the reasons therefor,"

to read.

"Provided a minimum of three days' notice of said meeting shall be given and reasons therefor."

 $\,$  And I move the amendment to the original  $_{\circ}$ 

PRESIDENT MOONEY: We've got to first put it on the floor.

CHIEF WINSLOW: O.K.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: Could I have a motion on No. 2 of the bylaw change?

CHIEF JOHN E. OBIER, JR.: [North Haven, CT] I move.

RET. CHIEF OTIS C. WYATT, JR.: [Narragansett, RI] Second.

CHIEF WINSLOW: Mr. President, I would like to amend that so the article, that second number provides that the President may call a special meeting of the Board of Directors provided that a minimum of three days' notice of said meeting shall be given and the reason therfor.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: Could I have a motion on the amendment?

CHIEF WINSLOW: So moved.

CHIEF BYRON ROGERS: [Westbrook, ME]

Second.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: Any discussion on the amendment? On the amendment.

All in favor?

[Aye]

Opposed?

[The motion carried.]

Now we're voting on the entire

article.

FROM THE FLOOR: As amended. PRESIDENT MOONEY: As amended. All

in favor say Aye.

[Aye]

Opposed?

Voted in the affirmative.

The next article:

"Registrants attending the annual conference/exposition, if combined with other sponsoring organization(s) shall be members in good standing of their respective sponsoring organization(s)."

CHIEF WINSLOW: Again, this was by the Board of Directors in relationship to the combined conference which we voted to have. At the time, the discussion was if we vote to have it how do we handle it so this was put forth at that time. I am also going to make an amendment to that.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: Could I have a motion for the original article?

CHIEF CHARLES Q. HALL: [Merrimac, NH] So moved.

RET. CHIEF WYATT: Second.
PRESIDENT MOONEY: Any discussion?

An amendment to go.

CHIEF WINSLOW: I would like to amend the motion sent out to the membership on that Article VI, Section 4 to now read:

Currently, the only way you can register is to be a member of the Association, therefore, we have to do something and this is one of the mechanisms that the bylaw committee felt could handle that situation and hopefully it will. All we can do is pass it and allow that membership registration in there so that it can be handled. If that doesn't work, we can do something else but at least it will give us a step forward in the combined conference next year.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: Any discussion on the motion? Voting or the amendment. All in favor of the amendment say Aye.

[Aye]
Opposed?

A vote in the affirmative.

Now we're voting on the article as

amended. All in favor say Aye.

[Aye]
Opposed?

A vote in the affirmative.

Any other business? Any business to come before this meeting?

Any other New Business?

CHIEF DAVID JORSEY: [East Berlin, CT] The Association would like to thank you for your year that you were in there and how you started the joint conference and it's going to happen and we'd like to present you with this ring from the Association and members.

PRESIDENT MOONEY: Thank you very much.

[Standing ovation.]

PRESIDENT MOONEY: Thanks very much. I would just like to say I certainly enjoyed my year as President. It was a busy year as you can see from the votes taken here today.

I want to thank some people and first of all Secretary/Treasurer and his wife Sally for all the work they did. I'll tell you why: I'm glad you took that vote today because there is no way a full-time Chief can do this job from now on, there's no way. I don't know how Dick has handled it in the last year.

I want to thank Charlie and his wife Linda for all the work they've done on the exhibits.

And I want to thank Tony Jarvis and being that guy who has been running around like a chicken with his head cut off and he's done a wonderful job and I truly appreciate it.

[Applause]

And we're going to get on with the program. As I told you, Chief Mooney told me I had to keep it moving right along and so

away we go.

The next person that I'm going to introduce is a very personal friend of mine and has been for quite a while and he's our speaker for this evening. He began his career in the fire service as a member of the Durham New Hampshire Fire Department in 1970. served as director of the University of Connecticut Fire Department from 1980 to 1983. Chief of the Salem Fire Department from 1983 to 1992. And he was appointed the New Hampshire State Fire Marshal in August 1992 and recently was reappointed to a second term as the State Fire Marshal. He's a Past President of the New Hampshire Association of Fire Chiefs. He's been very active in the National Association of State Fire Marshals and he's currently chairman of the Northeast Regional Fire Development Committee of NFPA.

He earned a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of New Hampshire and holds a Master's degree in public administration from the University of New Hampshire.

I very proudly present Donald P. Bliss, the New Hampshire State Fire Marshal. [Applause]

STATE FIRE MARSHAL DONALD P. BLISS: Thank you very much, Steve, it's always nice to have your grandfather introduce you at these functions.

[Laughter]

Nice to see you.

Father Foley, Chief Mooney, Chief Jorsey, Chief Wool, distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen. It's truly a pleasure for me to be here this evening, both to congratulate Chief Mooney on the completion of his term as President of the New England Association of Fire Chief, and to commend the members of the Association for another highly successful Conference.

And incidentally, Mike, I was in discussion with the governor's office last week and the governor asked me to convey his congratulations. There will be a letter of commendation forthcoming but he did wish for

me to congratulate you on not only leaving your term of office but thanks for your service as chairman of the Board of Fire Control of New Hampshire. So, our thanks to you.

## [Applause]

When Mike asked me to speak tonight, he gave me two basic ground rules. He told me to make my address interesting and, more importantly, to keep it short. I'm sure that I can conform to the latter and let you be a judge if I --

The theme I have chosen is the challenges faced by the fire chief in the year 2000. It's hard to believe in three-and-a-half years we will be arriving at the beginning of a new century. So far, if you read the papers, the biggest challenge we will be faced as a society in our high-technical world is that none of our computers will comprehend what the year 2000 means. Right now, most computers think that a date ending in zero-zero is actually 1900. And according to last Sunday's Boston Globe, the current estimates are it will cost over 600 billion dollars to modify the world's computer systems just to maintain the status quo and to keep business going as usual. That's actually three times what it cost to solve the national savings and loan crisis.

But you know and I know that there are far more serious problems that Fire Chiefs in the year 2000 will face if not met head-on that will cost lives and affect the very well-being of the communities that you have dedicated your careers to serving and protect.

I've come up with a brief list of what I predict will be the problems facing the Fire Chief at the turn of the century:
Reduced budgets, reduced staffing, both volunteer and career, increased demands for increased productivity, a new work ethic that will make us long for the what's-in-it-for-me generation, changing communities, and demographics, community growth without the commensurate growth in budget, staff or equipment, continued deterioration of the

inner city environment, decreased employment benefits, a tax on our retirement earnings and everyone is upset at that one — demands for new or expanded programs such as training in fire education, hazards material response, environmental protection, and license board.

There will be demands for absolute perfection in the application of fire ground tactics and strategy and demands for total elimination of firefighter injuries and absolutely no federal or state aid to perform any of these functions.

Most of you are probably sitting there saying to yourself: Nothing I've said is new as your already facing these issues and then some. Well, the difference is we can no longer think of cutbacks in resources and on demands for increased service as a passing fancy on the part of the few overzealous politicians. The reality is we have not seen the end of less government and better government movement, and coming from a state that has Live Free or Die on its license, I can assure you less government is alive throughout New England.

There's another disturbing trend that must be faced by the fire Chief in the year 2000. I'm sure you have noticed how the major problems faced by society are somehow passed onto the fire service to solve. Think about it. The epidemic of drug abuse has resulted in an epidemic of arson as the weapon of choice for revenge between individuals and between gangs.

The breakdown of the two-parent family system has resulted in juvenile fire-setting becoming one of the leading ways for young people to act out feelings of anxiety and frustration and abandoment. The overburdening of the criminal justice system means fire protection issues take a back seat to other threats to society.

The fire society is in the forefront of having to respond to the threats posed by domestic terrorism. Hatred has raised its head via the burning of churches and synagogues in every region of this country.

So not only does the Fire Chief in the year 2000 have to be a brilliant fire guard, he has to be part sociologist, part financial wizard, part teacher, and have the leadership ability of Moses, the wisdom of Solomon, and the patience and perseverance of Job. The farther I plug in those Biblical references --

REVEREND FOLEY: Pretty good, I might add.

[Laughter]

So how do we get out of this mess? It seems to me that each of us has four choices: One is to retire -- you can join Chief Wool in his county fishing in the summer and snowmobiling in the winter and spring -- you did do the three seasons this year.

RET. CHIEF WOOL: Yes.

FIRE MARSHAL BLISS: If you are already retired you can sit back relax and enjoy getting younger every day.

Thirdly, you might choose to stick your head in the sand and tune out and if you wait long enough, maybe nobody will notice and the problem will go away.

Or fourthly, make a compliment to yourself that you are trying to make a difference, no matter how small.

If you have chosen Number 4, and I'm sure that's what most of you have chosen, there are some things you can do to have an impact in the year 2000. Here are a few thoughts.

First of all, utilize networking to your fullest advantage -- meetings, conferences, associations such as this here, use of the internet, attendance at fire academy programs. Networking will help you to keep from reinventing the wheel, to learn from the mistakes of others, to find out how others are solving similar problems. And perhaps most importantly, to remind yourself that you are not carrying on the struggle all by yourself. Take the time to continue to educate yourself. The field of fire protection is changing constantly as is the

world of government and it is only logical the best way to stay ahead is to keep your mind sharp. Keep a global perspective and look beyond the traditional for solutions and from groups that shy away from such as law enforcement, public schools, labor groups, and citizen action organizations. Stay focused. Prioritize the problems that need to be addressed. Keep clear on your mission and on your department's mission and don't let others sidetrack you, it's easy to happen.

Perhaps most importantly, learn to practice good management skills by becoming proficient in time management and you will not feel too overwhelmed and lost.

There are truly three programs that we as the region's fire service can operate from to better serve the public. First of all, we need to make sure the fire service issues are part of the national political agenda. By supporting the Congressional Fire Service Caucus, by actively participating in our own national organizations, by regular contact with Congressional delegations and by influencing candidates in the early primaries we can keep attention focused on fire safety and fire protection issues at the national level.

Secondly, we need to make sure the fire service issues are part of our respective states' political agendas. The fire service represents a tremendous, tremendous voting block that must be reckoned with. Therefore, we should work towards unifying our statewide fire service organizations with having a common legislative agenda and in our own state fire chiefs' associations we should develop a legislative policy that can be clearly articulated by all members to their own local representatives.

And thirdly, we need to keep fire service issues high on the local political agenda because that's really where the action is, that is where the decisions are made that affect the ability of the fire service to carry out its mission of saving life and protecting property and that is where the

voters have the greatest day-to-day influence on the political leaders of our towns and cities. We need to market ourselves as a resource to the community and stay involved in the community planning process. And the greatest legacy that we can leave behind is the development of our command staffs and junior officers so the fire officers in the new century will be led by dynamic individuals.

All things considered, I truly believe in my heart that being a Fire Chief is one of the noblest professions that any human being can aspire to. Each of you serves unselfishly in the front line of public service and while sometimes facing what seems to be insurmountable odds you continue to rise to the challenge.

It has been a pleasure to spend a few minutes with you tonight and I truly wish you God speed as you carry out your life's work. Thank you very much.

[Applause]

RET. CHIEF WOOL: I'd like to call Acting Chief John Kyle up here, our Host Chief, to welcome this conference to his community.

ACTING CHIEF JOHN T. KYLE: Thank you. On behalf of the City of Marlborough, I'd say like to applaud the officers, Board of Directors, and members for a successful conference and thank the Association for having the conference in the city.

Further, I'd like to extend my thanks to the officers and the Board of Directors for their invitation to participate as Chief and their extension of kindness to my wife Janet and myself during the recent events. The officers and Board of Directors truly exemplify the Conference's theme of Vision For The Future and the ability to showcase support and the membership involvement is a credit to the Association.



# BYLAWS NEW ENGLAND ASSOCIATION OF FIRE CHIEFS, INC.

#### As amended 06/25/96

#### ARTICLE I

- Section 1. This organization shall be known as the New England Association of Fire Chiefs, Incorporated.
- Section 2. The purpose for which the corporation is formed are as follows:
- A. To operate as a non-profit corporation; to encourage and cooperate in the development of new techniques, equipment and practices; to promote more effective organizations and functions of the Firefighting Service, with a view toward greater protection of life and property from the dangers of fire and other hazards
- B. To aid in the dissemination of information among the Fire Chiefs of New England concerning: newly developed equipment and procedures for fighting fires and carrying out the other functions of the fire service; special hazards and problems presented by the development of new industrial and scientific processes and equipment; disasters caused by natural or human origin; practices in particular areas in the administration of Fire Departments; other matters affecting and concerning the fire service.
- C. To provide the means for: an exchange of ideas between its members; conducting of conferences between the members and with those having specialized knowledge on particular matters effecting the fire service; and the study of matters by its committees.
- D. To provide facilities and operate testing grounds for the display, demonstration and testing of equipment required and techniques of operation used in the fire service.
- E. To cooperate with the manufacturers and dealers in equipment used in the fire service with a view toward the dissemination of information to the fire service on the various devices available, and the development of better and more standardized equipment.
- F. To represent the interests of those in the profession of firefighting before legislative and other bodies considering matters in which they are concerned.

- G. To make charitable donations, including memorial and sickness remembrances, to members and their families, and other persons and communities who suffer financial hardships and losses through death, sickness, injury, conflagrations, and catastrophes.
- H. To receive gifts, and bequests, raise such monies and own such real property as is necessary for the advancement of the foregoing purposes.

#### ARTICLE II

Section 1. Whenever required to effectuate the meaning or intent here of, the singular shall include the plural, the masculine shall include the feminine, and vice-versa.

## **ARTICLE III - THE OFFICERS**

Section 1. The officers of the corporation shall consist of a President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Secretary/Treasurer and a Director from each of the six New England States. All officers shall hold their office for one year or until their successors have been elected. The offices of president, first vice president, second vice president will be on a rotation basis from the six New England States (Maine, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, New Hampshire, Connecticut, and Vermont). The President, the First Vice President, Second Vice President and Secretary/Treasurer shall be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting. A member shall be an active member in accordance with Article VII Section 1a when elected to office, except the Secretary/Treasurer may be an Honorary Life Member.

A candidate for election as a Director must be an active member in accordance with Article VII Section 1 a and a resident of the particular state which said Director will represent. He shall be nominated and elected by the members of that state.

All Active and honorary Life Members shall be eligible to vote for all elective officers.

#### ARTICLE IV - THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall consist of officers as provided by Article I and the past President who will serve as a member of the Board for one year. The exhibit chairperson shall be a non-voting member of the Board of Directors. The Board shall meet at such a time

and place as may be designated by the president. The actual expenses of the board, which includes travel at a mileage set by the Board of Directors each year, shall be paid by the corporation. Each member of the board shall have one vote, the holding of more than one office notwithstanding.

Section 2. The Past President, the First Vice President, and the Second Vice President shall constitute the Auditing Committee. The Auditing Committee will see that the books have been audited by an outside auditing firm each year before the annual meeting.

#### **ARTICLE V - DUTIES**

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the corporation, and the Board of Directors and shall be the official representative and spokesman of the Association. He shall call special meetings of the Board of Directors when so requested by the majority of the Board of Directors or whenever he deems such a meeting is necessary, provided that a minimum of a three day notice of said meeting shall be given and the reasons therefor. The President shall appoint all committees. All committee members shall be active members in accordance with Article VII Section 1a at the time of appointment. He shall perform such other duties as may be incidental to the office.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the First Vice President to perform the duties of the President during his absence. He shall assist the President in conducting the business and policies of the Association and perform such other duties as prescribed by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The Second Vice President shall assist the President and First Vice President to perform the duties of their office and in the absence of the President and the First Vice President, assume all the duties and responsibilities of the President.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Secretary/Treasurer to keep a complete record of the proceedings of special and annual meetings of the corporation, the meetings of the Board of Directors; and the standing committees, of which he shall be an ex-officio member; to receive and answer all communications pertaining to the corporation; cause to be prepared a full report of the proceedings of each annual meeting, which shall be printed and one or more copies, mailed by him to each member of the corporation. He shall receive all communications, contributed papers on topics, etc., designed to be presented to the meeting. He shall collect all monies due the corporation. The Secretary/Treasurer shall have the custody of the funds of the corporation; he shall keep a true account of all monies received and disbursed; pay all bills and at the Annual Meeting of the corporation and before all regular and special meetings

make a full and correct report of the same. He shall also employ such assistance as he may need for the collection of dues at the annual meeting and report the proceedings of the same and other such expenditures for clerical assistance at other times as may be approved by the Board of Directors. He shall execute a bond to the corporation in the sum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars to be approved by the Board of Directors, the expense of procuring the same to be borne by the corporation. The consultant fee of the Secretary/Treasurer to be fixed annually at the meeting of the corporation and a pay schedule will be determined by the Board of Directors. He shall also perform such other duties as shall be assigned to him by the President and the Board of Directors. He or any other officer shall not assume an individual indebtedness exceeding One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars without the approval of the Board of Directors. He shall be sworn to the faithful performance of his duties upon taking office. The Secretary/Treasurer shall prepare for adoption by the Board of Directors a list of members eligible for Honorary Life Membership.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to transact all the business of the corporation during the time intervening between the annual meetings. They shall have the full power to expunge from the minutes before printing, anything which is objectionable to the corporation or its members. The Board of Directors shall fill any vacancies occurring by death or otherwise during the time from one annual meeting to another and the replacement shall be chosen from the state involved after conferring with the last President of the NEAFC from that state; and may vote by two-thirds of the total number of Directors to remove any officer for cause. A quorum of five (5) Directors shall be required to transact any business. The Board of Directors shall have the power to make charitable donations, including memorial and sickness remembrances to members and their families, and other persons and communities, who suffer financial losses and hardships through death, sickness, injury, conflagration and catastrophes. The Board of Directors shall meet at least quarterly at a time, place, and date set by the President.

Section 6. The clerk of the corporation shall be the director from Massachusetts. The clerk shall perform the duties required under the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for corporations.

## ARTICLE VI - ANNUAL MEETING

Section 1. The annual meeting of the corporation shall be held each year during the month of June in conjunction with the annual conference, at such date and place designated by the Board of Directors, notification of the site to be announced to the members of the corporation at the

annual meeting. Proposals of sites for the annual meeting/conference shall be forwarded to the secretary not less than five days prior to the start of the annual meeting/conference by a member of the association or a company or corporation in business for this purpose. Proposals shall describe the features of the site, amenities and services to be provided and the cost that would be applicable for the current year that the proposal was presented. The cost information is for comparison purposes only. All site proposals shall be investigated by a site committee as appointed by the President. Proposed sites must be at a fully sprinklered facility and in compliance with state fire codes. This committee shall submit all information relative to the proposals to the secretary for disposition as provided above.

Section 2. A special meeting of the corporation may be called by the Board of Directors upon at least ten (10) days notice by mail to the members, said notice stating the time, place and purpose of said special meeting.

Section 3. The exhibit hall and the apparatus display shall at all times be under the sole control of the Exhibit Committee under such rules as the Board of Directors may adopt.

Section 4. A registration fee shall be charged every member registering at the annual meeting, the amount to be determined by the Board of Directors. A registration fee shall be charged every non-member registering at the annual meeting, the amount to be determined by the Board of Directors. Entrance to the exhibit hall or educational sessions will require a registration badge or a day pass.

Section 5. The Board of Directors shall have full power to levy an assessment and collect from the members an amount sufficient to cover the entire expense of the annual meeting.

Section 6. All proposed changes in the By-Laws and/or resolution to be presented at the annual meeting of the corporation shall be forwarded to the Secretary not less than sixty (60) days prior to the date of such meeting. All proposals shall be sent to each member by mail, not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. All proposals shall be posted in the vicinity of the registration area. A special meeting of the corporation shall be held on the first full day of the annual meeting/conference at which time the proposals shall be read. The proposals shall be voted on the last full day of the annual meeting/conference. A 2/3 vote of the members present and entitled to vote and voting shall be necessary for adoption. The membership by majority vote may request a secret ballot.

Section 7. A portion of the Annual Conference shall be set apart for

the holding of a memorial service in the memory of departed members at an appropriate time and setting as designated by the Association Chaplins and approved by the Board of Directors.

Section 8. Nomination and election of officers, shall be by secret ballot on the last full day of the annual meeting/conference. All officers elected will be installed at the annual banquet which shall be held on the evening of the last full day of the annual meeting/conference and shall swear to the following oath of office: "I, (name) hereby swear that I will support the Constitution and By-laws and at all times bear allegiance to the goals and purposes of the New England Association of Fire Chiefs, Inc. I further swear to perform the duties and responsibilities of my office to the best of my ability and at the end of my term of office, I will deliver to my successor all records of said office, so help me God."

Section 9. Reports of all committees will be presented on the last day of the annual meeting/conference. The Secretary shall prior to the next annual meeting/conference arrange for the distribution to all members the activities of the annual meeting/conference and meeting of the Board of Directors.

#### **ARTICLE VII - MEMBERSHIP**

## Section 1. The membership shall consist of:

#### A. Active Members:

- (1) The Chief of the Fire Department of a regularly organized public fire department;
- (2) Chief of a private Fire Department that provides municipal service;
- (3) Chief of an industrial Fire Department;
- (4) State Fire Marshal;
- (5) Full time employed Fire Commissioners;
- (6) Fire Directors;

#### B. Associate Members:

(1) City or Town Officials, Fire Commissioners, Assistant or Deputy Chiefs or members of fire departments, individuals and individuals representing firms and corporations interested in the protection of life and property against fire.

(2) Associate members shall be entitled to all the privileges of membership in the corporation except the right to vote and as otherwise provided in these By-Laws.

#### C. Honorary Life Members:

(1) Honorary Life Members shall be entitled to vote on all matters. Honorary Life Members shall be entitled to all privileges of an active member except as otherwise provided in these By-Laws. Honorary Life Members shall not be required to pay annual dues, however, the Board of Directors may assess Honorary Life Members a fee to cover mailing costs. Honorary Life Membership may be conferred upon active members upon their retirement from office, provided they have been active members of the corporation or its predecessor, The New England Association of Fire Chiefs for a period of five years immediately preceding the date of their retirement, and provided further that they are not identified with fire protection - from a commercial standpoint. Honorary Life Membership will be withdrawn in the event the member becomes identified with fire protection from a commercial standpoint, but may be reinstated by making application to the corporation and receiving a positive vote at an annual meeting.

### D. Life Membership:

- (1) Individuals, firms and corporations interested in protection of life and property against fire, shall be eligible for life membership upon payment of the fee established in the fee schedule. The Board of Directors may assess Life Members a fee to cover mailing cost.
- (2) Life Members shall be entitled to all the privileges of membership in the corporation except the right to vote and as otherwise provided in these By-Laws.
- Section 2. No member who is in arrears for dues and assessments shall be entitled to vote at any meeting of the corporation, and any member who is in arrears on June 1st shall receive a second notice and if still in the arrears on August 1st he shall be dropped from membership.
- Section 3. Dues and Fees Schedule: Dues and fees for Active, Associate, Honorary Life, and Life Members shall be set by the Board of Directors and voted on by the membership at the next annual meeting.
- Section 4. Application for all classes of membership shall be received by the Secretary/Treasurer. The proposed member has to be

sponsored by a member in good standing with the corporation. The Secretary/Treasurer shall after investigation approve or disapprove the application except as otherwise provided in these By-Laws. If a question of eligibility arises, a decision to approve or disapprove shall be determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 5. The Secretary/Treasurer shall not register or give a badge or extend any courtesies of the annual meeting to any member whose dues and assessments are not paid to date in full.

Section 6. No member shall be expelled from the membership by vote of less than a majority of all members of the corporation, nor by a vote of less than three-fourths (3/4) of the members present and voting on such expulsion.

#### ARTICLE VIII - AMENDMENTS OF BY-LAWS

Section 1. This corporation shall have full power at a meeting called for that purpose, to alter, amend or repeal these By-Laws, but the same shall not be done except by a vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the members present and entitled to vote at said meeting. The membership by majority vote can request a secret ballot. However, no such proposed amendment shall be considered that has not been read and posted as provided in Article VI, Section 6.

#### ARTICLE IX - RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The presiding officer shall preserve order and decorum. All questions of order shall be decided by him, subject to appeal by any member to the parliamentarian.

Section 2. In a decision of any question coming before the annual meeting for which no provisions are made in the By-Laws, the presiding officer shall be governed by the rules laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 3. Every member, when he speaks or offers a motion, shall rise in his place, properly identify himself, and respectfully address the presiding officer and when finished shall resume his seat. He shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoid all improper personal references and indecorous language.

Section 4. When two or more members shall rise to speak at the same time, the presiding officer shall decide who shall have the floor.

Section 5. A member called to order by the presiding officer shall immediately cease speaking on the question before the house, and shall not resume his remarks until the question is settled.


