MEETING

Meeting called to order at 2:31 P.M.

CHIEF PEARSON: Good afternoon. We'll call our meeting to order for the New England Association of Fire Chiefs. Welcome everyone. My name is Stu Pearson, the current president, and I am from the state of Rhode Island.

At this time I would ask that you please put your cell phones on vibrate so we can continue with our business.

Please rise for the Pledge of Allegiance.

(Whereby the Pledge was recited by the group led by Chief Pearson.)

CHIEF PEARSON: For the invocation, I'd like to call Reverend Leckie. Please remain standing.

REVEREND LECKIE: Let us pray. Lord God again we come before you with humble hearts asking Your blessing upon this meeting, this association, and the Expo which we are about to begin. May the men and women who attend this learn more about leadership in the fire service and our New England states and with your guiding hand improve in the ways that are possible to best serve the people who look to us for help, and the men and women who serve under the chiefs and the associated officers. Thank you for the many years of this organization, 91 years of this Expo, and especially those who have gone before us on whose shoulders we stand. We pray and thank you for all the things that You do for us. Amen.

CHIEF PEARSON: Thank you. I have a couple of introductions of special guests that we have here. Chief Metcalf from the International Association of Fire Chiefs. Chief, welcome. Also Chief Rhoda Mae Kerr from Austin, Texas, candidate for 2nd Vice President of the International Association of Fire Chiefs. Welcome.

Another guest that we do have is Commissioner Fraser from the Boston Fire Department. Commissioner, again, welcome. Thank you for coming.

Just a little change of business right now. At this time, Commissioner, would you like to come forth and talk about an event that is being planned in which the New England Association of Fire Chiefs is a partner with this upcoming event.

COMMISSIONER FRASER: Good afternoon and thank you very much for allowing me to address you real quickly here at your meeting. And thank you again Chief Pearson for inviting me.

Chief Rhoda Mae Kerr, Austin, Texas seeking support for her candidacy to 2nd VP, IAFC

I'd like to thank the New England Fire Chiefs who decided to be a partner with us in the International Conference for Fire and Rescue Executives. When I was approached about doing the conference in Boston the first thing I did was say which of our regional partners would like to partner with us. I think it's more than just a Boston. I think it's good to bring everybody together; the New England chiefs, the Mass chiefs, the Rhode Island chiefs, New Hampshire chiefs, Connecticut chiefs, are on board. The Maine chiefs. There's a lot of support from all the different organizations who said, yeah, we want to help and be part of the conference.

So the conference is November 13th to the 15th in Boston at the Westin Boston Waterfront. The theme is "The New Reality: Can We Meet the Challenge?" What that refers to is for most of us that have had some kind of budgetary cuts during this economic downturn the reality is we are probably not going to come back. As the economy increases the cities are not going to look to plus a lot of departments up to where they were at, unfortunately.

You could be in a city where that does happen, where they decide you know what, times are better, we're going to give the departments more money. But, you know, what if they don't? How do you prepare for that? That's kind of the theme of this year's conference.

We have had a great response from invitations to people from around the country and around the world to be guest speakers. I just want to go through our list of confirmed speakers, people that have already agreed to come speak to us: Lloyd Ayers, Commissioner of Philadelphia Fire Department; Chief Burrell from the Calgary Fire Department, Ontario Canada; Salvatore Cassano, Commissioner of the New York City Fire Department; Chief Brian Cummings from Los Angeles Fire Department; Commissioner Ron Dobson from the London Fire Brigade; Bobby Halton who I think everybody in this room knows, the editor in—chief of the Fire Engineering Magazine; Chief Charles Hood of the San Antonio Fire Department; Chief Fire Officer Christian Isler from Switzerland as one of our international speakers; Chief Jeff Lambert from Victoria, British Columbia, Canada; Dr. Lenny Marcus from Harvard who was at the initiative this week, Some of you might have actually gone through that program; Chief Dennis Rubin who was the chief in Washington DC until a couple years ago; Chief Jose Santiago from the Chicago Fire Department.

We have a number of fire chiefs who wanted to speak. We are still waiting to hear back from some others. The fire chief from Tokyo is supposed to speak. We don't have official confirmation from him yet.

We have a great mix of speakers and a great mix of topics. I brought a bunch of brochures which I will leave here. You can distribute them. Has anyone been to this conference other than Chief Kerr. You've been there, right? She spoke two years ago at this conference? Yes. I have attended this conference. I didn't go last year, which it was held in New Orleans. I went to the conference in Seattle. I was invited to speak out there.

One of the things I thought about this conference was it focuses on leadership and management. And I think that is something that everybody can learn from each other. It's good to hear what these people have to say. Some of the people that are speaking, for example James Mack, who is the Commissioner in Detroit — I don't know if anybody knows Mack — he was the second deputy commissioner in Detroit.

He retired. They got a new mayor. The mayor called him at home and said we want you to come back and be the commissioner. He came back. Nine months later he gets fired by the mayor over this controversy over a stolen wallet. It's a very compelling story. What these guys are trying to say is, look, these are the kinds of things that can happen in this crazy world where the media is all over you. Rubin has a compelling story. Many of those guys have compelling stories when it comes to stuff like that.

Then there are some people talking about real leadership challenges and mentoring people. I had a discussion with Bob earlier about mentoring people underneath you so that they can rise up and take the job some day. How are people doing that? What are some best practices? There's a lot of good topics I think.

Aside from that, I think the fact of meeting new people, networking. These are chiefs from around the world that you can reach out to and call up and talk to about different things. I think that is huge. It expands everybody's horizons. I'm excited to bring these people in from around the country and around the world to interact with my command staff, my chiefs from my department so we can learn from each other and discuss how different things — how people do things different in other areas than how we do things. We can all learn from each other.

It's a good opportunity to listen, a good opportunity to network, and it's an opportunity to come to Boston and enjoy our city which I think a great city. It's a fun place. I think it's fun.

And I said to someone the other day, I said you know, when I was a kid I grew up in the country, I grew up in Maine, northern Maine, and I always said to my self the last thing I'm every going to do in this life is live in the city. And I live in Boston. It's interesting. It's a lot of fun, there's always something to do. You guys from the big cities know what I'm talking about. There's always something to do in the city. You can't be bored.

So unlike in my younger days when we used to take a trip to the big city, now I find myself taking a trip to the wilderness. I just got back. I was with the chief in Maine and I went up there fishing for three or four days and I rented a cabin. My wife said Why are you going up there? Why don't you stay with relatives? Because there is no electricity. They can't call me. There's no cell phone and I can just disappear for three or four days. It was a lot of fun.

So, any questions? I don't want to take up any more of your time. This is a great opportunity.

Chief?

CHIEF: No disrespect. Being a past president of the IAFC I just have to view a couple of my thoughts. It's a great educational piece. Unfortunately the company that runs it is a for—profit company. They are in competition with the IAFC. So the money that goes in this goes into someone's pocket, it doesn't go back into the fire service where even the FRI goes back into the fire service. So I won't be attending.

And, you know, I would suggest that if you want to go for good educational piece, that's fine. If you want to put money in someone else's pocket that's not going to come back to the fire service, that's fine also. I just think I need to put that out.

COMMISSIONER FRASER: Okay. That's not a question but any questions? I think that whatever conference you go to it's who is going to be there, who are the speakers, what are they speaking about, what am I learning about? I think we have a dynamite group of speakers coming to this conference.

I went to the conference in the past to look and see how it was done. I don't agree with the idea this is in competition with the IAFC. You have something that is totally different in my. They put on a good product. I don't we're trying to say that other

conferences aren't good, or that this conference is better than any other conferences. But this is going to be a great conference.

I think, you know, you need to look at the educational piece, the networking piece, and the strengthening of the fire service. Nothing says you can't go to both conferences.

CHIEF: Money says that.

COMMISSIONER FRASER: That's a budgetary decision you make on your own. But I disagree with you, just because something is for profit, or it may be something for profit. The company takes a lot of risk. Whichever company is standing up to do something like that has to fork up a lot of money up front and risk that money in hopes to break even or make a profit. Whether they make a profit or not, that is them taking the risk. The I—Chiefs have it for profit.

CHIEF: This company does also. The consulting company that the IAFC had is to we can get that money and put it back into the membership to benefit the membership. This for—profit company puts the money in their pockets, it doesn't go back into the fire service. That's the point I'm trying to make. I'm right.

COMMISSIONER FRASER: You're 100 percent correct. I don't disagree with that. I would say, hey, this is America. Someone puts on a good product and people pay money to go and partake of their product, they make money off of it, that's what makes the world go round.

Anything else? Thank you for your time. I hope to see you guys around this afternoon and tomorrow ample the show floor. I'll leave these in the back if anyone would like one.

CHIEF PEARSON: Thank you, Commissioner. (Applause.) CHIEF PEARSON: Next I would like to ask Chief Kerr to come up and say a few words, please.

CHIEF KERR: Thank you. So some of you in the room were here a little bit earlier so you heard what I had to say. First I do want to say thank you for your hospitality and for allowing me the time to speak. I am running, declared my candidacy, and I'm working on my campaign for the IAFC 2nd Vice President.

I here to ask for your support, ask for your endorsement, and also just to tell you a little bit about what my campaign platform is, any maybe just a little bit about myself. I'm not going to take too long because I know you have other things to do. There are plenty of things and not enough time.

I'm a 30-year veteran in the fire service and I'm proud to say

that I'm also a fourth generation fire fighter. So even though I didn't know the first generation, my great grandfather, I remember seeing pictures of him, and I mentioned this at the last meeting, standing there holding the bridals of the horses with the steamer pumpers in the back. So for me it's kind of a legacy and an exciting time.

I remember saying to my dad, Gosh, what would great granddad think if he knew I was a fire chief? I said, gosh, he must be rolling over in his grave. He said, oh, no, honey, he'd be so proud of you. You know I'd be honored to represent all of the IAFC, members as their 2nd vice president and then as I move through the chairs.

My lovely assistant is going to help me pass out these cards. They are the same although they are two different photos, and on the back of those cards is a brief statement of what my platform is. I do have a platform. I promise that if — when I'm elected, I'm going to be positive, there is somebody else that is running as well — but anyway my platform talks about building upon the past.

We have two members, in fact they are sitting right next to each other, that are former IAFC presidents. They have both done really good things. Bill Metcalf, wherever you are, I know you were in the room, he may have left, going to be the next president, they are all doing really good things. So I don't want the membership to think that we don't want to billed upon the past.

I believe that one of the things that we have become successful at but are certainly not there yet is reducing line of duty deaths and working on fire fighter health and safety issues. You know, just in the last five months in the state of Texas there have been 17 line of duty deaths. Seventeen. It didn't just stay with a metro department. It wasn't just a paid department. They were volunteer departments, they were large metropolitan fire departments, they were small career departments. So it impacts all of us.

I think no matter what size department or what type department, I think we can all agree we can and should work towards reducing line of duty deaths.

The last memorial service I was in was in the Reliant arena down in Houston, and I'm sitting there and I'm thinking I hope that in my lifetime and in my career and under my watch I never have to have a memorial service for a line of duty death. So I

believe that it is important that we continue our work upon that and to build upon that. I know that it's not just the line of duty deaths but it's the health and safety of the fire fighters and ourselves making sure that we can go on to serve another day.

The other thing is responding to today and just in the previous meeting and n so many discussions I have had since I arrived yesterday talking about what are the things that are happening today that we have to respond to. Certainly one of those is the Affordable Health Care Act. How is that going to impact us? Chief Wall just spoke on how that may impact the volunteers and how you pay them, and I know some of that comes under the Fair Standards Act, but how are we going to respond to that? How are we responding to today's economy?

So all those things are important. And, of course, how do we prepare for the future? Some of those things could include smoke alarm programs, engaging our community. We have a saying in the Austin fire department that says Do Your Part. That means that each of us have to do our part.

As chiefs we have to do our part in making sure that we do everything we can to help our fire service out there. Our fire fighters have to do their part by training, by following the policy, by being safe, but the community has do to their part as well.

So I think we have to work really hard at engaging your communities and everybody had to learn to do their part. I think we have to talk about and look at how do we get to reduce fire deaths in America? I have heard so many discussions so many times about America burning. But there is one thing that can really make a difference on that America burning and fire fatalities and those are sprinklers. They don't require anybody to do anything. I know that like in my own community I'm never going to get probably every building to have sprinklers, but I know that I can get working smoke alarms in every single home. So that is my goal in my community, is to get working smoke alarms in every single home. If all of us all across the country were working on sprinklers then we could really make a difference in the number of people that are dying every day from fires.

So I appreciate your support. I appreciate your allowing me some time to speak. And I would ask for your vote. I would ask for your support. And I don't know what your protocol is but I would also like to ask for your endorsement as I go forward. Thank you for the time. Thank you for the hospitality. I will be

here through the evening. I leave tomorrow morning. I will be very happy to talk to any of you or answer any questions that you have.

Thank you.

(Applause.)

CHIEF HOWARD: Thank you, Chief Pearson. Good afternoon, everyone. "President/Chief Stuart Pearson, Board of Directors and Members;

I herewith submit the report of the Exhibit Committee for the 2013 New England Fire/Rescue/EMS Expo.

The Committee consisted of Vice Chair Chief Sayles, Chief Morrissey, Chief Lambert, Chief Morrill, Chief Murray, Chief Varney, Tom Simonelli of the New England Fire Equipment Exhibitors Association and Jack Morris of the New England Fire Apparatus Maintenance Association.

255 Notices were sent out on July 01, 2012 and August 1, 2012, regarding the pre-registration deadline of September 1, 2012.

August 1, 2012, thank you letters with pre-registration forms were mailed to 255 exhibitors. On September 1, 2012, those vendors who pre-registered were notified by letter and this process continues with some Exhibitors/Vendors requesting additional Booth(s) and or Vehicle Space(s) and new vendors registering for the 2013 Fire/Rescue/EMS Expo Show.

On January 22, 2013, 141 Address Change letters with the Exhibit Chairman's New P.O. Box address were sent to those exhibitors currently pre-registered for the 2013 EXPO Show. This letter also included their booth number(s) and current balance due. Also, the letter requested they e-mail any changes in their contact information to us. It was the thought that balances due would be paid earlier and that any changes in contact information would be received and updated in the data base before the April, 2013 mailing. Additionally on January 22, 2013, 248 address change letters were sent to those exhibitors currently NOT registered for the 2013 EXPO Show.

Finally, on Monday, April 15, 2013, 384 exhibitor packets where mailed to vendors in the United States and Canada for the 2013 Fire/Rescue/EMS Expo Show.

As of May 1, 2013, 175 vendors have pre-registered for the 2013 Fire/Rescue/EMS Expo Show. This number is up 34, from the 3rd quarter report as of February 7, 2013, filed on February 14, 2013, with the Board of Directors. Note: 4 vendors have cancelled attending the 2013 Expo show since the February 14, 2013 pre-register date.

Also, as of May 1, 2013, twenty-two (22) new vendors have registered for the 2013 Expo Show. This is up 17 from the 3rd

quarter report as of February 7, 2013, filed on February 14, 2013, with the Board of Directors.

960 exhibitor name badges were printed prior to the opening of the 2013 Fire/Rescue/EMS Expo Show and we continue to print exhibitor badges at this time.

I would like to thank President Pearson for appointing me as Chairman of the Exhibit Committee, the Committee members, Chief Wehter for all his work for the Committee, and the Board of Directors for their support throughout the year. I would like to thank the chiefs from the New England Association, New England Division and their spouses along with the late President William Miller for all he did for all of us, current President Paul Lamoureux and Jack Morris from the New England Fire Apparatus Maintenance Association and President, Jim Lyons and the members of the New England Fire Equipment Exhibitors Association for all their help setting up the exhibits during the Expo and removing the vehicles after the Expo concludes.

I would like to thank Chief Charlie Maurais, retired, Linda Maurais, Chief Tom Lambert, retired, Mary Lambert, and Tom Simonelli from the New England Fire Equipment Exhibitors Association for helping to stuff the registrations packets for the exhibitors on Wednesday afternoon. Many thanks go to Mary Anne Flaherty, Chief Charles and Linda Maurais, Chief Tom and Mary Lambert, and all the workers assigned to the office and show setup and take down. I would like to thank Greg Chiekco and Jessica Castro our representatives from the Eastern States Exposition along with his staff. The smooth operation of the vendor's office could not have been achieved without the tremendous support from all organizations and the exhibitors throughout the year.

Also, I want to recognize my wife Jennifer for all she does for this Annual Conference."

For those of you who don't know Jen has cancer, so — we'll talk about that later.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have heard the Exhibit Committee report. A motion would be in order.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have a motion. Do we have a second? CHIEF SURPRENANT: Chief Surprenant, retired, Wilbraham. Second.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have a motion, a second, any more discussion? (No response.) All signify by saying aye. (A vote was taken.) Any nays? (No response.) So moved.

Professional Development Committee, Chief Seltzer.

CHIEF SELTZER: The Professional Development Committee this year worked on the current conference being held this weekend. We have two presenters, Howard Cross on leadership. He will be presenting two seminars tomorrow. And Chief John Sullivan from Worcester Fire Department on operations on critical incidents. He will be presenting on Saturday. We have 31 people signed up for tomorrow morning, 11 for tomorrow afternoon. Those are repeat conferences, repeat seminars, by Howard Cross. There will be one seminar Saturday morning by Chief Sullivan and we have 35 people signed up for that.

The other thing the Professional Development Committee is working on is doing some off season seminars, or a seminar, something similar to what the New England Division of the IAFC has done, presenting something maybe in the fall or off season to the regular shows so we can get some more training out there.

CHIEF PEARSON: Thank you. A motion to accept the Chief's report would be in order.

CHIEF ROY: Chief Alan Roy, Palmer Fire Department.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have a motion. Do we have a second?

CHIEF: From Connecticut. second.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have a motion, a second, any more discussion? (No response.) All signify by saying aye. (A vote was taken.) Any nays? (No response.) So moved.

Advertising. Chief Wehter.

CHIEF WEHTER: The advertising followed last year's format.

We sent out the save the day post cards in the early winter around February. Then the booklets went out in April, followed shortly by posters, which normally run in the First Responder Newspaper but this year they were mailed. We missed the deadline. The tri-fold which goes out to approximately ten thousand attendees within the last three years. We had a fairly good response as far as advertising. The economy is down a little bit and we noticed that throughout the whole process here. Other than that the advertising this year was positive.

CHIEF PEARSON: At this time a motion would be in order to accept the advertising report.

CHIEF CHACONAS: Chief Chaconas Ludlow, retired.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have a motion, do we have a second?

CHIEF FLAHERTY: Chief Flaherty, West Springfield, second.

CHIEF PEARSON: All those in favor signify by saying aye. (A vote was taken.) Any nays? (No response.) So moved. Registration.

CHIEF WEHTER: Again, as I reported for the last three years registration is not doing as well, it's just not there, a full conference registration. Eight people signed up this year for the full conference. So I don't know what else to tell you except that during today's ability to secure education on—line and all the avenues that are available I am seeing it more, departments are not being given funds to attend the conference.

As far as the Expo is concerned over at Eastern States, it's still over the past years it maintains that five to six thousand attendance, so that part is still good. What's happening here is different. The directors have been talking about coming up with a different format maybe having the conference separate from the Expo with seminars or something like that. That's not concrete, that's just in the planning stages as far as that goes. So that's it.

CHIEF PEARSON: Thank you, Chief. At this time a motion would be in order to accept the registration report.

CHIEF: Westfield Fire Department.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have a motion, do we have a second?

CHIEF RICHARD: Chief Richard, Enfield Fire Department.

CHIEF PEARSON: All those in favor signify by saying aye. (A vote was taken.) Any nays? (No response.) So moved.

Banquet.

Saturday evening as usual our banquet will start at 6:30 with a reception, light hors d'ouevres outside the main ballroom. We

have a guest speaker, Chief Seltzer will be talking about the Station Nightclub fire, ten years later. We hope to see everybody there. We always have a good time. The food is good. If you haven't got a ticket please see Kathy and help us out this year. Moving along, Golf Committee, Chief Flaherty.

CHIEF FLAHERTY: We had a great day yesterday in golf. We had 110 golfers. I'd like to thank all the sponsors who sponsored holes and donated prizes for the winners. It was a great day overall.

CHIEF PEARSON: Thank you. Do we have any old business?

(No response.)

Do we have any new business?

(No response.)

Next in order would be our by-laws proposals. The by-laws committee has been working very, very diligently, very hard this year to go through our by-laws. We gave direction from the board of directors, the executive board gave some direction, on the way to go. All of the directors here have had an opportunity to participate. The by-laws are on the back table. I am for support. I'd like to go around to each state director, if I may, to give a brief overview of our by-laws. Chief Morrill, our First Vice President.

CHIEF MORRILL: Thank you, Mr. President. As President Pearson has just said the by-law committee worked diligently along with the Board reviewing the proposed changes. May of these changes are simply grammatical; EMS. Other topics are simply fire. And some of the change will also give us the opportunity to look at separating the Expo from the annual meeting. Without those changes it just makes it more difficult. Along with the recommendations from the association's attorney, which is the very end of the by-law changes, just to catch us up to speed. I recommend the changes.

CHIEF PEARSON: Chief Casner.

CHIEF CASNER: The Connecticut delegation met earlier and we are in support of the by-laws. This is also — part of the changes are the result of the last 18 months of the strategic plan that we've been working on. There's really not a lot — there are a few that are substantial as far as how we operate. It gives the board of directors the ability to do things that, like Chief Wehter said, we can change directions as far as splitting up the conference. We don't have that ability now. Most of these are

all made in the best interest of continuing the organization and continuing the Expo. We feel that they are changes for the positive and our committee delegation supports the changes.

CHIEF PEARSON: Chief Ruggles.

CHIEF RUGGLES: I don't have much to add to what has already been said. It was a housekeeping item. We needed to address and update the by-laws, take a look and see where the organization is and where it's going. So we stand in support of it as well. The group that met in the Vermont delegation are also in support.

CHIEF PEARSON: Chief Morrissey.

CHIEF MORRISSEY: Not to keep beating the horse but we have had a lot of diligent reviews and talks about it. We struggled with some of it. Some of it is how we are structured, how members and employees, people we have work for us, what their titles are and all that. The intent there was to get the bylaws to where we could live with them. Look what we have. Many of our positions are elected positions. If someone chooses to vacate that position or chose not to be re-elected, we wouldn't have that smooth transition into another person. The option we have presented to you, or will present, is that we go to an appointed position where there would be an interview process. request applications and review them. That way if you're having a transition with an employee in or out you can get that institution of knowledge. When you can't assign someone to follow someone who is going to retire, or leave because they are done with their term, if you don't have that person. We could hear them and the body could vote if that's not who you want. Then you wouldn't have that smooth transition or that ability to make sure, or documentation to verify. So that's really why we did what we did.

CHIEF MURRAY: Just to expand a little on that the New Hampshire delegation did meet and they whole-heartedly support this, too. In a lot of senses our mission and value statement for the organization is towards professional fire chiefs, to keep the informed of modern technology and apparatus. So therefore with the strategic plans and looking at the by-laws we look at that as sort of a corporation. It was time to update these by-laws to help us move forward in the future.

CHIEF SELTZER: We discussed this also in the Rhode Island caucus. There weren't any major objections to it. Further I would say that this is an opportunity to move our organization

forward. These are changes that are need to keep this organization up with the times. The other day I actually brought up a motion at a board meeting that this was no intent upon the hard work and diligence of our President and Secretary/Treasurer, there was no intent against their positions. The Board is going to maintain them as we have right along. We're just looking at a more efficient way to fill those positions as Chief Morrissey mentioned.

Also I would say this was not taken lightly. There was a lot of work put in by the committee. At our quarterly board meeting — it came up at just about every meeting and at our last quarterly board meeting we spend an extreme amount of time going over all of this. Also our legal, the lawyer that represents the organization, took a look at it. So a lot of eyes have looked at this and we think it's best for the organization.

CHIEF PEARSON: At this time the chairman of the by-laws committee, Chief Norris.

CHIEF NORRIS: Thank you, Chief Pearson. To just reiterate what Bob said, in no way is this change going to eliminate anybody that is presently with us. Dick has put in many years of hard work in this organization and when we thought about doing the by-laws change we felt that it was time to do the change because he indicated this may be his last term as Secretary/Treasurer. What the Board has done, before I get into the changes, what the Board has done is we have voted with the Chief from Rhode Island to set up, if the by-laws are passed, a process in which Chief Wehter stays on but at some point if Chief Wehter decided to retire in that 3-year-period, or at the end of three years, we would, the Board would, look to hire his replacement, hire his replacement six months prior to his departure, and keep him on if he would six months after his departure as a consultant. Then we would have a clean transition of this organization. There is so much history lying in one man, who has worked so hard for this organization, that we didn't feel we were properly prepared to have a transition go without a by-law change.

Saying that, we worked very hard in doing the changes. The Board again — and I'm not going to repeat myself, but want to assure you that Chief Wehter is here, he's not going anywhere. By the by-law requirement we have to redo the by-laws. Prior to us doing that when Chief Coulombe made the motion to have our attorney, the corporate attorney, look at the by-laws — and

if my colleague would take the last two pages, pages 11 through 13, Chief Morrissey, please — the corporate attorney added these sections after the deadline of February 15th.

All the way at the end of document, the last three pages.

These documents were posted as per the by-law requirement up at the registration area the other night. What he has included is an indemnification article, he's included a liability article, a restrictions on activities article, conflict of interest article. And those are what corporate counsel has asked to be added. Because they were not done by the February 15th deadline but this meeting has been called to do by-law changes, under Article 8: Section 1. This corporation shall have full power at a meeting called for that purpose, to alter, amend or repeal these By Laws, but the same shall not be done except by a vote of two thirds (2/3) of the members present and entitled to vote at said meeting.

What we are asking is that the membership allow these requirements of counsel to be added to the by-laws before we go through them to present the by-law changes to you.

CHIEF PEARSON: At this time a motion would be in order. Can we have a motion?

CHIEF FRANK: Mr. Chairman, I have a question on the bylaw changes. I think we're being very gender-wise as far as what we're doing over here because under Section 4 I believe it is Article 5, it is he, he, he all the way through. After coming here today and seeing we may have a she, she, I want to know why they don't put he/she or 'the person'.

CHIEF NORRIS: Under Article 2 of the by-laws it is in place and has never been changed. The Board did not feel it needed to be.

"Section 1. Whenever required to effectuate the meaning or intent herein, the singular shall include the plural, the masculine shall include the feminine, and vice-versa.

That was part of the original by-laws and we did not feel they needed to be changed. It's not a sexist or gender thing.

CHIEF: I only going by what — this was e-mailed to me. I was reading it I felt as if we've got a female chief, she's going to be, hey, I'm not a he and I'm up here and I'm on the Board over there.

CHIEF NORRIS: No disrespect, Chief, I think the point in discussing the by-laws can be a point of order after we approve adding these to them, do the reading of the by-laws as required by the by-law ordinance, and then I would think that the Chair

would entertain interaction. But I think we're not there yet.

CHIEF TRAVERS: Mr. Chairman, Tim Travers, Whitman, Massachusetts. I make a motion that we include the package not originally included as recommended by the attorney.

CHIEF PAROW: Chief Parow, Chelmsford, Mass. I second. CHIEF PEARSON: We have a motion, and we have a second. It's open for discussion.

CHIEF FLAHERTY: That 2/3 vote you were talking about, is that just on this motion or does it now require when we vote on the by-laws as one package that the whole thing has to be 2/3?

CHIEF NORRIS: That will have to be 2/3 as well.

CHIEF FLAHERTY: Thank you.

CHIEF: Mr. Chairman, would it be in order to have the Secretary/Treasurer voice his opinion before a vote.

CHIEF NORRIS: I think that would come prior to this.

CHIEF PEARSON: This is just this here. So we have a motion on the floor. Am I correct is saying that?

CHIEF COULOMBE: Right.

CHIEF PEARSON: This is to add what we have here. So we have a motion and a second. Any more discussion? (No response.) Seeing none, all signify by saying aye. (A vote was taken.) All those opposed? (No response.) So moved.

CHIEF NORRIS: Now in keeping bye the by-laws requirement these have to be read. So just bear with me.

CHIEF: Question.

CHIEF NORRIS: Sir?

CHIEF: Do you only read the sections that have changed?

CHIEF NORRIS: That is my intent.

CHIEF: Thank you.

CHIEF NORRIS: We put it on the screen to everybody can see what we're talking about if you hadn't gotten them on an email, if you hadn't gotten a copy. We will go down to Section 2(A). Section 2. The purpose for which the corporation is formed, and its mission, is as follows; A. To operate as a non-profit corporation; to encourage and cooperate in the development of new techniques, equipment and practices (ADD to improve public safety regarding fire prevention and control;) to promote more effective organizations and functions of the fire fighting (ADD services including municipal fire departments,) with a view toward greater protection of life and property from the dangers of fire and other (ADD related) hazards.

B. To aid in the dissemination of information among the Fire

Chiefs of New England concerning: newly developed equipment and procedures for fighting fires and carrying out the other functions of the (ADD Capped the word Fire) Departments (ADD S); (WORD SERVICE WAS STRICKEN.)

Special hazards and problems presented by the development of new industrial and scientific processes and equipment; disasters caused by natural or human origin; practices in particular areas in the administration of Fire Departments; other matters affecting and concerning the Fire/ (ADD *Rescue/EMS*) Services.

- C. To provide the means for; an exchange of ideas between its members; conducting of conferences between the members and with those having specialized knowledge on particular matters affecting the Fire/ (ADD *Rescue/EMS*) Services; (ADD *S*)and the study of matters by its committees.
- D. To provide facilities and operate testing grounds for the display, demonstration and testing of equipment required and techniques of operation used in the Fire/ (ADD *rescue/EMS*) Services.
- E. To cooperate with the manufacturers and dealers in equipment used in the Fire/ (ADD *Rescue/EMS*) services with a view toward the dissemination of information to the Fire/ (ADD *Rescue/EMS*) service (ADD s) on the various devices available, and the development of better and more (ADD *standardized equipment*.)
- F. To represent the interests of those in the profession of Fire fighting/ (ADD Rescue/EMS) before legislative and other bodies considering matters in which they are concerned (ADD to the extent permitted by organizations exempt from taxation under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3).)
- G. To make charitable donations, including memorial and sickness remembrances, to members and their families, and other persons and communities who suffer financial hardships and losses through death, sickness, injury, conflagrations, and (ADD catastrophes as permitted under the provisions of I.R.C. 501(c)(3).)
- H. Any request for a donation to a candidate running for (ADD office in a tax exempt organization connected with the mission of the NEAFC) must be submitted to the Board of Directors for a recommendation to the Annual Meeting at least thirty (30) days prior to said meeting. I. To receive gifts, and bequests, raise such monies and own such real property as is necessary for the advancement of the foregoing purposes. (NO

CHANGES.)

ARTICLE II MEANING OR INTENT

Section 1. Whenever required to effectuate the meaning or intent (ADD *herein*) the singular shall include the plural, the masculine shall include the feminine, and vice—versa.

ARTICLE III — THE OFFICERS Section 1. The officers of the corporation shall consist of a President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, (ADD Secretary/Treasurer, Clerk) (STRIKE Secretary/Treasurer) and (ADD six State Directors, one) from each of the six New England States. Candidates for the elected positions of President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, (STRIKE Secretary/Treasurer) and State Director, shall make their intentions known that they are a candidate for office by submitting their candidacy to the Secretary/Treasurer no less than ninety (90) days prior to the Annual Meeting for posting in the conference brochure or other mailing at least sixty (60) days prior to the Annual Meeting (CAPPED). All officers, (ADD except the State Directors), shall hold their office for one year. (STRIKE Except the Secretary/Treasurer who shall hold office for three years or until their successors have been elected.) The offices of President (CAPPED), First (CAPPED) vice president (NOT CAPPED — SIC), Second Vice President (CAPPED) will be on a rotation basis from the six New England States (Maine, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, New Hampshire, Connecticut, and Vermont) (ADD unless otherwise voted by the members at the Annual Meeting). The President, the First Vice President, Second Vice President (STRIKE: And Secretary/Treasurer) shall be elected by ballot at the (CORRECTED SPELLING OF the) the Annual Meeting. (ADD In order to ensure the continuity of the organization the First Vice President and the Second Vice President shall ascend to the next higher position upon the creation of a vacancy (due to the end of a term, a voluntary separation or removal of an officer) this shall be confirmed by an affirmative vote of all State Directors (CAPPED). All Officers) (STRIKE A member) shall be (STRIKE an) active member (ADD s) in accordance with Article VII Section 1a when elected to office. (STRIKE: Except the Secretary/Treasurer may be an Honorary Life Member.) (ADD Section 2. Executive Board shall consist of the President, First Vice President, Second Vice President and the Immediate Past President ("Executive Officers"). The Executive Board shall have the power to act on behalf of the Board of Directors between meetings and its actions shall be reported to the Board of Directors at the next board meeting for ratification

and approval.)

ARTICLE IV — THE BOARD OF DIRECTOR

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall consist of (ADD the) (6) (CAP S) State (CAP D) Directors; (STRIKE With a three year term) and (ADD the) (4) (CAP E) Executive (CAP O) Officers (STRIKE which will serve a period of one year). (ADD Each Director shall serve until his successor is duly elected.

(STRIKE: *The exhibit chairperson shall be a non voting member of the Board of Directors.*) The Board shall meet at such a time and place as may be designated by the (CAP P) President. The actual expenses of the board, which includes travel at a mileage set by the Board of Directors each year, shall be paid by the corporation. Each member of the board shall have one vote, the holding of more than one office notwithstanding.

(ADD Section 2. A candidate for election as a State Director must be an active member in accordance with Article VII Section 1a and a resident of the particular state, which said Director, will represent. He shall be nominated and elected by the NEAFC members eligible to vote (five bugle Chief of Department/District (Active), and Honorary Life Chiefs) of that state. Directors shall serve for a term of three (3) years or until their successor is duly elected. The term of the Directors shall be staggered so that not more than one—third of the Directors are elected in any one year. (STRIKE The) (ADD Each) of the State Director shall request an eligibility list of qualified voters from the Secretary/Treasurer prior to holding an election. The election of Directors will be at the respective states caucus held during the Annual Meeting (STRIKE Conference) with the results announced at the Annual Meeting. All Active and honorary Life Members shall be eligible to vote for the (STRIKE all) elective offices of their respective states.) (ADD Section 3. Action without a Meeting. Any action that may be taken at a meeting of the Board of Directors may be taken without a meeting if written consent setting forth the action is signed by all Directors and is Filed with the minutes of the proceedings of the Board. Such consent shall have the same effect as a unanimous vote at the meeting of the Board of Directors.) (ADD Section 4. Telephonic Meetings. One or more directors may participate in a meeting of the Board of Directors by means of conference telephone or similar communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other. Participation in a meeting pursuant to this Section shall constitute presence in

person at the meeting.

ARTICLE V — DUTIES

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the corporation, (STRIKE *and*) the Board of Directors, (ADD *and the Executive Committee. The President*) shall be the official representative and spokesman of the Association (ADD *subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.*) He shall call special meetings of the Board of Directors when so requested by the majority of the Board of Directors or whenever he deems such a meeting is necessary, provided that a minimum of a three day notice of said meeting shall be given and the reasons therefore. The President shall appoint all committees and appointees with the approval of the Board of Directors. Appointees as defined in Article X, Sections 1 and 2, may be an Honorary Life Member. He shall perform such other duties as may be incidental to the office.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the First Vice President to perform the duties of the President during his absence. He shall assist the President in conducting the business and policies of the (ADD *Corporation*) (STRIKE *Association*) and perform such other duties as prescribed by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The Second Vice President shall assist the President and First Vice President to perform the duties of their (STRIKE *office*) (ADD *offices*) in the absence of the President and the First Vice President, assume all the duties and responsibilities of the President.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Secretary/Treasurer keep a complete record of the proceedings of special and annual meetings of the corporation, the meetings of the Board of Directors; and the standing committees, of which he shall be an ex-officio member; to receive and answer all communications pertaining to the corporation; cause to be prepared a full report of the proceedings of each annual meeting, which shall be printed and one or more copies, made available to each member of the corporation. He shall receive all communications, contributed papers on topics, etc., designed to be presented to he meeting. He shall collect all monies due the corporation. Any committee collecting monies shall, no less than weekly, transmit said monies to the Secretary/Treasurer. The Secretary/Treasurer shall have the custody of the funds of the corporation; he shall keep a true account of all monies received and disbursed; pay all bills and at the Annual Meeting of the

corporation and before all regular and special meetings (ADD of the Board of Directors) make a full and correct report of the same. He shall also employ such assistance as he may need for the collection of dues at the annual meeting and report the proceedings of the same and other such expenditures for clerical assistance at other times as may be approved by the Board of Directors. He shall execute a bond to the corporation in the sum of One million (\$1,000,000.00) dollars to be approved by the Board of Directors, the expense of procuring the same to be borne by the corporation. (STRIKE The consultant fee of the Secretary/Treasurer to be fixed annually at the meeting of the corporation and a pay schedule will be determined by the Board of Directors. He shall also perform such other duties as shall be assigned to him by the President and the Board of Directors. He or any other officer shall not assume an individual indebtedness exceeding one thousand (\$1000.00) dollars without the approval of the Board of Directors. He shall be sworn to the faithful performance of this duties upon taking office. The Secretary/Treasurer shall prepare for adoption by the Board of Directors a list of members eligible for Honorary Life Membership.)

(ADD The Secretary/Treasurer shall be appointed by the Executive Board with the approval of the Board of Directors. He shall perform such other duties as assigned to him by the President and/or the Executive Board. Neither he nor any Officer shall (STRIKE *not*) assume any (STRIKE *individual*) indebtedness exceeding One Thousand (\$1000) Dollars without the approval of the Board of Directors. The Secretary/Treasurer shall be a paid employee of the corporation and shall be considered an employee at will. A pay schedule will be determined by the Executive Board and approved by the Board of Directors.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to transact all the business of the corporation during the time intervening between the annual meetings. They shall have the full power to expunge from the minutes before printing, anything, which is objectionable to the corporation or its members.

Section 6. The Board of Directors shall fill any vacancies occurring by death or otherwise during the time from one (CAP A) Annual (CAP M) Meeting to another and the replacement shall be chosen from the state involved after conferring with the last President of the NEAFC from that state; and may vote by (ADD a) two thirds of the total number of Directors (STRIKE *to*) remove

any officer for cause. A quorum of six (6) Directors (ADD or two thirds of the acting Directors whichever is less) shall be required to transact any business. (STRIKE The Board of Directors shall have the power to make charitable donations, including memorial and sickness remembrances to members and their families, and other persons and communities who suffer financial losses and hardships through death, sickness, injury, conflagration and catastrophes.) The Board of Directors shall meet as necessary at a time, place, and date(s) set by the President or a majority vote of the Board of Directors. Section 7. The (CAP C) Clerk of the corporation shall (ADD be appointed annually by the Board of Directors and shall) be the director (ADD residing in) (STRIKE from) Massachusetts. The clerk shall (ADD also serve as the resident agent for the corporation and) perform the duties required under the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for corporations. (STRIKE insert: The Clerk shall be appointed by the Board of Directors annually.)

ARTICLE VI — ANNUAL MEETING

Section 1. The (CAP A) Annual (CAP M) Meeting of the corporation shall be held each year (STRIKE in conjunction with the annual conference) at such date and place designated by the Board of Directors.(STRIKE notification of the site to be announced to the members of the corporation at the annual meeting). Proposals of sites for the (CAP A) Annual (CAP M) Meeting or conference shall be forwarded to the Secretary/Treasurer not less than sixty days prior to the start of the (CAP A)Annual (CAP M) Meeting (ADD Meeting/conference) by a member of the association or a company or corporation in business for this purpose. Proposals shall describe the features of the site, amenities and services to be provided and the cost that would be applicable for the current year that the proposal was presented. The cost information is for comparison purposes only. All site proposals shall be investigated by a site committee as appointed by the President. Proposed sites must be at a fully sprinklered facility and (ADD a facility in full)compliance with state fire codes. This committee shall submit all information relative to the proposals to the Secretary/Treasurer for disposition as provided above.

Section 2. A special meeting of the corporation may be called by the Board of Directors upon at least ten (10) days notice by mail to the members, said notice stating the time, place and purpose of said special meeting.

Section 3. (ADD Any) (STRIKE The) exhibits and (ADD/or the)

apparatus display shall at all times be under the sole control of the Exhibit Committee under such rules as the Board of Directors may adopt.

Section 4. A registration fee shall be charged every member registering at the (CAP A) Annual (CAP M) Meeting, the amount to be determined by the Board of Directors. A registration fee shall (ADD *also*) be charged every non—member registering at the (CAP A) Annual (CAP M) Meeting, the amount to be determined by the Board of Directors. Entrance to the exhibit hall or educational sessions will require a registration badge or a day pass.

Section 5. The Board of Directors shall have full power to levy an assessment and collect from the members an amount sufficient to cover the entire expense of the (CAP A) Annual (CAP M) Meeting. Section 6. All proposed changes in the Bylaws and/or (ADD any) resolution to be presented at the (CAP A) Annual (CAP M) Meeting of the corporation shall be forwarded to the(STRIKE Secretary/Treasurer) (ADD by-law Committee) no later than February 15th (ADD unless waived by a vote of the Board of Directors). All proposals shall made available to each member (in good standing), not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. All proposals shall be posted in the vicinity of the registration area. A special meeting of the corporation shall be held on the first full day of the (CAP A) Annual (CAP M) Meeting (STRIKE conference) at which time the proposals shall be read. The proposals shall be voted on at the (CAP A) Annual (CAP M) Meeting (STRIKE conference). A 2/3 vote of the members present and entitled to vote and voting shall be necessary for adoption. The membership by majority vote may request a secret ballot.

Section 7. (ADD During the conference which, may include(STRIKE s)the Annual Meeting, a (STRIKE A) portion of the (ADD *conference*) (STRIKE *Annual Conference*) shall be set apart for the holding of a memorial service in the memory of departed members at an appropriate time and setting as designated by the Association Chaplains and approved by the Board of Directors.

Section 8. Nomination and election of officers shall be by secret ballot at the (CAP A) Annual (CAP M) Meeting (STRIKE conference). All officers elected will be installed (STRIKE at the annual conference) at a time and place designated by the Board of Directors and shall swear to the following oath of office: "I, (name) hereby swear that I will support the Constitution and

Bylaws and at all times bear allegiance to the goals and purposes of the New England Association of Fire Chiefs, Inc. I further swear to perform the duties and responsibilities of my office to the best of my ability and at the end of my term of office, I will deliver to my successor all records of said office, so help me God."

Section 9. Reports of all committees will be presented at the (CAP A) Annual (CAP M) Meeting (STRIKE *conference*). The Secretary/Treasurer shall prior to the next (CAP A) Annual (CAP M. Meeting (STRIKE *conference*) arrange for the distribution to all members (ADD *of a summary of the activities*) (STRIKE *of the annual meeting/conference and meeting*) of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VII — MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership shall consist of: A. Active Members: (1) The Chief of the Fire Department of a regularly organized public fire department; (2) Chief of a private Fire Department that provides municipal service; (3) Chief of an industrial Fire Department; (4) State Fire Marshal; (5) Full time employed Fire Commissioners; (6) Fire Directors B. Associate Members: (1) City or Town Officials, Fire Commissioners, Assistant or Deputy Chiefs or members of fire departments. individuals and individuals representing firms and corporations interested in the protection of life and property against fire. (2) Associate members shall be entitled to all the privileges of membership in the corporation except the right to vote and as otherwise provided in these by-laws. C. Honorary Life Members: (1) Honorary Life Members shall be entitled to vote on all matters. Honorary Life Members shall be entitled to all privileges of an active member except as otherwise provided in these bylaws. Honorary Life Members shall not be required to pay annual dues; however, the Board of Directors may assess Honorary Life Members a fee to cover mailing costs. Honorary Life Membership may be conferred upon active members upon their retirement from office, provided they have been active members of the corporation or its predecessor, The New England Association of Fire Chiefs for a period of five years immediately preceding the date of their retirement, and provided further that they are not identified with fire protection from a commercial standpoint. Honorary Life membership will be withdrawn in the event the member becomes identified with tire protection from a commercial standpoint, but may be reinstated by making application to the corporation and receiving a positive vote at an

annual meeting.

- D. Life Membership:
- (1) individuals, firms and corporations interested in protection of life and property against tire, shall be eligible for life membership upon payment of the fee established in the fee schedule. The Board of Directors may assess Life Members a fee to cover mailing cost. (2) Life Members shall be entitled to all the privileges of membership in the corporation except the right to vote and as otherwise provided in these by-laws.

Section 2. No member who is in arrears for dues and assessments shall be entitled to vote at any meeting of the corporation, and any member who is in arrears on June 1st shall receive a second notice and if still in the arrears on August 1st he shall be dropped from membership.

Section 3. Dues and Fees Schedule: Dues and fees for Active, Associate, Honorary Life, and Life Members shall be set by the Board of Directors and voted on by the membership at the next annual meeting.

Section 4. Application for all classes of membership shall be received by the Secretary/Treasurer The proposed member has to be sponsored by a member in good standing with the corporation. The Secretary/Treasurer shall after investigation approve or disapprove the application except as otherwise provided in these by-laws. If a question of eligibility arises, a decision to approve or disapprove shall be determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 5. The Secretary/Treasurer shall not register or give a badge or extend any courtesies of the annual meeting to any member whose dues and assessments are not paid to date in full.

Section 6. No member shall be expelled from the membership by vote of less than two thirds (2/3) of the membership present at the Annual Meeting, nor of a vote of less than 30 members present and voting on such expulsion.

Section 7. Code of Ethics with Guidelines The mission of the New England Association of Fire Chiefs (N.E.A.F,C.) is to pursue the protection of life and property by leadership, education, and support for its members and affiliate organizations. N.E.A.F.C, members and appointees have a special responsibility to the community, as well as legal and ethical obligations ensuing from service. These responsibilities impose duties inherent to the fire service, including the promotion and protection of public trust

and confidence, avoidance of conflicts of interest and appearances of impropriety, as well as careful and informed management of public finances. These duties must at all times guide the conduct of all N.E.A.F.C. members and appointees.

Conflict of Interest — A conflict of interest refers to situations in which private interests or personal considerations may compromise a chief officer's judgment and his or her responsibility to act in the best interest of the fire service. Members should always hold themselves to the highest standard of personal integrity by avoiding all conflicts of interest or the appearance of the same.

Appropriate Conduct — The N.E.A.F.C. expects all members to maintain the highest standards of professionalism, judgment, maturity and personal integrity; to comply with all applicable laws; and to treat others with dignity and respect.

Equal Opportunity — All decisions pertaining to hiring practices, volunteer recruitment, appointments, pay adjustments, promotions, and discipline should prohibit discrimination because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, sexual orientation, political affiliation, disability, age or marital status.

Anti-Harassment and Non-Discrimination — The N.E.A.F.C. believes that all employees and volunteers have the right to work in an environment where everyone can achieve their full potential without being impeded by discrimination or harassment. Members should have no tolerance for acts of inappropriate and illegal discriminatory behaviors in the fire and emergency service.

Partnerships/ Relationships — Members should develop and maintain a healthy partnership/relationship for the purpose of improving the quality of life for fire service personnel and the citizens that they serve.

Wellness-Fitness — The N.E.A.F.C. supports the Wellness—Fitness/Safety Initiative. Members have a responsibility to adopt policies to maintain fit, healthy and capable fire fighters and EMS personnel.

Personal information and Privacy — Members should strive to protect employee/volunteer privacy interests and to prevent inappropriate disclosures of information from an employee or volunteers personnel record.

Outside Employment— Members should not engage in, solicit, negotiate for, or promise to accept private employment,

nor should they render services for private interests or conduct a private business when such employment, service, or business creates a conflict with or impairs the proper discharge of their official duties, Members shall not engage in outside work or business activities that runs contrary to the central mission of the organization and damages the Associations reputation with the general public.

Use of Department Property Internet — Use of Association property is limited to the conduct of official business and uses that are allowed to the general public. Internet, E—mail and Voice Mail — Internet access, e—mail and voice mail are provided for business use. incidental and appropriate personal use is permissible.

Public Speech — The N.E.A.F.C. respects the rights of members for personal self— expression. However, members who identify themselves as employees/volunteers of their departments in public communications must make it clear that the views expressed are their own and do not necessarily reflect the views of their departments or the N.E.A.F.C.

Confidential Information — Members should not disclose to others, or use to further their personal interest, confidential information acquired by them in the course of their official duties.

Impression of Influence — N.E.A.F.C. members should conduct their official and personal affairs in a manner that avoids any impression of influence and disclose any personal relationships that may give the impression of influence. Members should not accept gifts, money, discounts or favors including a benefit to family members, friends or business associates if the gift could be reasonably inferred or expected that the gift was intended to influence them in the performance of their official duties, or acceptance of the gift is forbidden by state or local law or Association policy.

Personal Appearance — Members are expected to dress in a clean and neat manner appropriate to their job responsibilities and consistent with the standards of professional, appearance and dress.

Political Activities — N.E.A.F.C. members generally are entitled to exercise their rights to hold membership in or support a political party; to participate in political campaigns; to vote; and express their opinions on political campaigns; to vote; and express their opinions on political subjects or candidates.

Members should not, however, participate in political activity during the scheduled workday. Likewise members should not participate in political activity as a representative of the N.E.A.F.C. (STRIKE unless specifically directed to by the leadership of the N.E.A.F.C.)

E. Special Honorary Life Membership maybe conferred by approval of the Board of Directors for Associate/Vendor members.

ARTICLE VIII — AMENDMENTS OF BY-LAWS

Section 1. This corporation shall have full power at a meeting called for that purpose, to alter, amend or repeal these By Laws, but the same shall not be done except by a vote of two thirds (2/3) of the members present and entitled to vote at said meeting. The membership by majority vote can request a secret ballot. However, no such proposed amendment shall be considered that has not been read and posted as provided in Article VI, Section 6.

ARTICLE IX — RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The presiding officer shall preserve order and decorum. All questions of order shall be decided by him, subject to appeal by any member to the parliamentarian,

Section 2. In a decision of any question coming before the annual meeting for which no provisions are made in the Bylaws, the presiding officer shall be governed by the rules laid down in Roberts Rules of Order.

Section 3. Every member, when he speaks or offers a motion, shall rise in his place, property identify himself, and respectfully address the presiding officer and when finished shall resume his seat. He shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoid all improper personal references and indecorous language.

Section 4. When two or more members shall rise to speak at the same time, the presiding officer shall decide who shall have the floor.

Section 5. A member called to order by the presiding officer shall immediately cease speaking on the question before the house, and shall not resume his remarks until the question is settled.

ARTICLE X — STANDING COMMITTEES AND APPOINTEES Section 1. Appointees

Members appointed as Sergeant-

at-Arms, Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, (STRIKE *Exhibit Chairman*), Parliamentarian, (STRIKE, *and Professional*

Development Program Coordinator) shall be an Active Chief or Honorary Life Member Chief. Clergy appointed as Association Chaplains shall have no membership status. Section 2 Standing Committees A. Advertising, Audit, by-laws, Professional Development, Exhibit, Financial, Memorial Service, Red Book, Conference Format Committee, Registrations (ADD B. The chairman of each standing committee shall be a current Director or Officer of the Association.)

(ADD C. The President with the approval of the Board of Directors may from time to time establish "working groups" intended to meet the organizations needs.) (ADD Section 3. The Past President, the First Vice President, and the Second Vice President shall constitute the Auditing Committee. The Auditing Committee will see that an outside auditing firm has audited the books each year before the annual meeting and shall review the results of the audit with the auditor and recommend to the Board of Directors any changes in accounting practices or procedures recommended by the auditor.)

(ADD ARTICLE XI — INDEMNIFICATION)

(ADD Indemnification. Except as otherwise provided in this Section, the Corporation shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless any director, officer, or employee of the Corporation who was or is a party, or is threatened to be made a party, to a threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding (whether civil, criminal, administrative, or investigative, and whether formal or informal) as provided herein. The Corporation shall indemnify the director, officer, or employee against expenses, including attorneys' fees, judgments, penalties, fines and amounts paid in settlement, actually and reasonably incurred by such person in connection with the action, suit or proceeding. The Corporation shall indemnify a director, officer, or employee only if the person acted in good faith, with the care an ordinarily prudent person in a like position would exercise under similar circumstances, and in a manner that the person reasonably believed to be in the interests of the Corporation. With respect to a criminal action or proceeding, the person must have had no reasonable cause to believe that his or her conduct was unlawful. To the extent that the director, officer, or employee or of the Corporation has been successful on the merits or otherwise in defense of an action, suit or proceeding, or in defense of any claim, issue or other matter in the action, suit or proceeding, the director, officer, or employee shall be

indemnified against the actual and reasonable expenses, including attorneys' fees, incurred by him or her in connection with the action, suit or proceeding, and any action, suit or proceeding brought to enforce this indemnification provision. Unless ordered by a court, any indemnification permitted under this Section shall be made after (a) determining that the indemnification is proper under the circumstances because the person to be indemnified has met the applicable standard of conduct and, (b) evaluating the reasonableness of the expenses, and of the amounts paid in settlement. No indemnification shall be provided for in connection with (a) the receipt of a financial benefit to which the person is not entitled, or (b) a knowing violation of the law.)

(ADD ARTICLE XII — LIABILITY)

(ADD Liability of Directors. No director or officer of the Corporation shall be personally responsible to its creditor for any indebtedness or liability and any and all creditors shall look only to the Corporation's assets for payment. Further, neither any officer, the Board nor any of its individual members shall be liable for acts, neglects, or defaults of an employee, agent or representative selected with reasonable care, nor for anything the same may do or refrain from doing in good faith.)

(ADD ARTICLE XIII — RESTRICTIONS ON ACTIVITIES)

(ADD No part of the net earnings of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributed to, its Directors, Officers, or other private persons, except that the Corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments or distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth herein. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be for the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation. The Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provisions of these by-laws, no Director, Officer, employee or agent, or any their representative of the Corporation shall take any action or carry on any activity by or on behalf of the Corporation that is not permitted to be taken by an organization exempt under 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as it now exists or may hereafter be amended, or any corresponding section of any future tax code.)

(ADD ARTICLE XIV — CONFLICT OF INTEREST)

(ADD No person who is a Director, Officer or administrative employee of the Corporation shall undertake, continue or maintain any personal or business interest which is in conflict with or adverse to the interests or activities of the Corporation, except to the extent that such Director, Officer, or administrative employee has, in good faith, fully disclosed in writing to the Board of Directors or its designated executive committee the nature and circumstances of such personal or business interest, and received approval thereof. Any possible conflict of interest on the part of any Officer of the Corporation, member of the Board of Directors, or any member of the administration with the authority to act over others, shall be disclosed to the Board of Directors and made a matter of record. Any Director having a possible conflict of interest on any matter before the Board shall not vote nor use his or her personal influence on any vote. The minutes of the meeting shall reflect that a disclosure was made and that the member abstained from voting. The foregoing requirements shall not be construed as preventing the governing Board member from briefly stating his or her position or from answering pertinent questions from other members of the Board. All persons subject to this Article shall be advised of this Article before entering on the duties of the office.)

CHIEF PEARSON: Thank you, Chief Norris. I will entertain a motion for discussion of the by-laws and the changes.

CHIEF SPURR: Mr. President, Chief Spurr from Massachusetts. I make a motion to discuss the by-laws.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have a motion. Do we have a second? CHIEF FLAHERTY: Chief Flaherty, West Springfield. Second.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have a motion and a second for discussion. Is there any discussion?

CHIEF MAURAIS: Chief Maurais. I understand Dick is — you are saying Dick would stay on. Mike, being the Exhibit Chairman, what will happen in his situation?

CHIEF PEARSON: The exhibits chair the exhibits person, hopefully a director will take over as Exhibits Chair. It would be an Exhibit Chair or an exhibits person

CHIEF MAURAIS: How would Mike fall into that?

CHIEF PEARSON: At the end of this year it is up to the reappointment of the new president, whoever is coming in.

CHIEF MAURAIS: But what is the position?

CHIEF PEARSON: Right now there is no position.

CHIEF COULOMBE: I think what he's asking is what the duties would be. The duties for whoever fills that position are the duties — the same duties except they become a non-voting being. That position, the exhibits chair position, is a non-voting member of our Board of Directors.

CHIEF PEARSON: That's what I said basically.

CHIEF COULOMBE: But the duties of — for the vendors, exhibit coordinator, whatever that get titled, will be the same. I think for the Board the biggest change there would be removing the Exhibit Chairman as a non-voting member of the Board of Directors.

CHIEF MAURAIS: I don't think I could ever vote for that. The exhibits chairman can never vote on items?

CHIEF COULOMBE: They are a non-voting member but they are a member of the Board of Directors.

CHIEF MAURAIS: That's not going to work.

CHIEF PEARSON: Any more discussion?

CHIEF PAROW: Chief Parow, Chelmsford, Mass. There's a lot in these by-laws, the changes. There is wording which is I think well appropriate and then there is a couple of big issues taking people that are in voted positions out of being voted positions to be appointed positions. We went through this — and any organization goes through this as they try to grow — and we went through this in Massachusetts. And we decided to take the legislative position out of the voting position.

CHIEF MORRISSEY: No, it was the secretary/treasurer.

CHIEF PAROW: Oh, the secretray/treasury (sic) position we were going to take out as being a voted position. I think I was pretty firm on it. Again, I'll be firm on it today. I think that at least the treasurer's portion, the person that is watching my money, the association's money, and this association has a lot of money, I think he should be — that should be a voted position. Because he works for me, not for the Board of Directors, not for the president. He works for the whole association. He should be voted for by me.

I wouldn't be opposed to dividing the secretary's and treasurer's positions up, and having the secretary appointed on an annual basis, but I'm opposed to having the person who is watching my money be appointed by the Board. It's kind of the fox watching the hen house. Not that I think anybody is going to be dishonest but I just want that extra added protection.

And so the second piece that I want to know is you brought

out, and it's been brought up protecting Dick's position, blah, blah, blah; that really doesn't enter into my thought process here but it's said we would take — the problem we have now is we have Dick with all this institutional knowledge. And these by-law changes, from at least what you said, would change that. How does — where does — how does that stop the secretary/treasurer, whether he's appointed or elected, not to still maintain all this institutional knowledge and you have the same problem when the next secretary/treasurer decides to leave or you fire him.

CHIEF MURRAY: May I comment on that, Mr. President? CHIEF PEARSON: Sure.

CHIEF MURRAY: One of the issues here is the secretary/treasurer's position is no longer really a secretary/treasurer's position. He does the advertising. He does every — all the set—up for the show. You know, working with Mike the whole time. It's not like he's just doing secretary work and treasurer. And I kind of agree with you about the treasurer thing. I can see where you're going with that. But I think the point behind this is when we appoint somebody in that position we appoint somebody that is qualified to handle the job description. No longer it's just a secretary, it's — he's almost like — he really is the executive director of this association. He really is. I mean he takes care of everything. He provides guidance for all of us. And to fill those shoes I think you need to have — it's not — I don't think it's a popularity contest where I want the most votes, I think it's become — we need somebody qualified enough to do all that work should Dick leave.

And I think that's probably one of our biggest concerns in the Board's discussions.

CHIEF PAROW: That creates the — you just are perpetuating it again. How is it that we are being told that these by-law changes are going to stop that institutional knowledge? If you were appointing someone was just like Dick, that is qualified to do it, and he's still going to do the same jobs and still do the same thing, know does that solve the institutional knowledge —

CHIEF MURRAY: It doesn't. It doesn't.

CHIEF PAROW: You've been telling us that the by-laws do that.

CHIEF PEARSON: You can't solve — I think we all can — you can't solve that problem. There is no one answer for that

question.

CHIEF PAROW: But you've been saying what you've been saying. You've been telling us that it does — it does solve that problem. And I don't understand how it does.

CHIEF MORRISSEY: I think the president said earlier a lot of that is operational, too. A lot of it is records, past procedures. For example this past year the Board of Directors took ten years of minutes of the organization, broke them down, pulled out all the motions and all the actions of the Board, institutional knowledge, that we put together, that aspect of it.

Here is the other issue, okay, with this secretary/treasurer, and it happens — it happened up in New Hampshire and it's happened to a lot of other chiefs associations, okay? The secretary/treasurer's position is, I bet you in all those other organizations, was never intended to be paid like an employee. Okay? Over ten thousand dollars a year for the work he does, good word and dedicated work he does, but when you are running a business organization like that the secretary/treasurer position can't maintain and be a voting member of a board where he is essentially voting on his own pay raise, or he's voting in areas which could bring on conflict of interest.

That is one of the main reasons. And conflicts, as we're running into, in our growing organization. Therefore, the Board has taken that voting possession away and we're going to treat him like we would a contractor or any other employee and do it legally. You can still have an elected member not being a voting member on the Board of Directors. For example in the community you have your finance director. He's elected. He doesn't vote with the Board of Selectmen. Not every elected person votes with the board.

CHIEF PAROW: So, I'm not following you why he has to be a non—voted person, he or she, and — because you don't want him voting with the Board of Directors. You have a valid point but there is other ways to do it and still have an elected —

CHIEF MORRISSEY: Again, that point, Jack, goes further than that. We as an organization, an \$800,000.00—plus corporation, are looking to move forward and lean towards and executive director or business—type position. And we say it's time to modernize that and move in that direction. That's what it is straight up.

CHIEF PAROW: Why wouldn't you just change that in the

by-laws? Change the organization's objectives?

CHIEF MORRISSEY: Because like any organization and stuff, one step at a time. We -

CHIEF PAROW: We're taking a lot of steps here.

CHIEF MORRISSEY: Yes, but this is new ground for all of us but we don't want to go too far either, in case it doesn't work out. We want to have that flexibility to go back and forth as we need to for the benefit of the organization.

CHIEF TRAVERS: Tim Travers, retired, Massachusetts. We've heard the Board's presentation. Was the Board of Directors vote to present these to the body a unanimous vote?

CHIEF PEARSON: Yes.

CHIEF TRAVERS: It was a unanimous vote. I was going to ask if it wasn't for a report. But there is none because it was unanimous.

CHIEF COULOMBE: It was unanimous among the Board to bring it to the floor.

CHIEF TRAVERS: Thank you.

CHIEF FRANK: Mr. President, a few years back, many years back, I worked my butt off to get it where it is today, I'm not really satisfied with it to be totally honest with you, but I was told many years back when we had our president back — I think it was around 1999 or 2000, a man I greatly respect, John Parow. We were sitting one day and we had a little discussion with Dick Wehter. He pointed a finger at Dick Wehter and said to Dick, As long as I'm president, you answer to me.

Am I right on that, Dick? Do you remember those days back? I got a hell of a memory. I remember the day I was born. I can tell you that now. I recall that.

I think it had to do with the fireworks to be honest with you. And you were opposed to spending that money on fireworks and John said to you, As long as I'm president, you work for me. Does it still go that way today, Mr. President? Does Dick Wehter answer to you?

CHIEF PEARSON: Yes, he does. And this Board of Directors. CHIEF: Article XIII, the description on activities, 5th line down. I don't have my glasses, I apologize. It says, "No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be for the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation." Isn't one of our responsibilities for this organization, as legislation has borne out, from the different programs to benefit the fire service that we be active in that?

CHIEF NORRIS: I'll read because I have my glasses.

CHIEF: Thank you.

CHIEF NORRIS: That article says:

"—No Director, Officer, employee or agent, or any other representative of the Corporation shall take any action or carry on any activity by or on behalf of the Corporation that is not permitted to be taken by an organization exempt under 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code." We cannot — because we are 501(c)(3), and that is why the attorney put that in there and it talks about monies, Darrel. You have to have a pact. It doesn't mean you as a person can't do it. We can't pay money to do it. Because we're 501(c)(3).

CHIEF: That's not —

CHIEF NORRIS: It says no part of the earnings of the corporation shall be used.

CHIEF: I don't see that.

CHIEF NORRIS: That's the first line. It says —

CHIEF: No, this says, "No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be -"

CHIEF NORRIS: Start at the beginning. The beginning of the article talks about earnings. The earnings carries forward into that article. That's what that article is talking about. That's what the attorney said. We can't spend monies for political legislation because we are a 501(c)(3.)

CHIEF: Wouldn't it be — the way I read it, Barry, is that the association whether spending money or not can't say anything.

CHIEF NORRIS: No, that is contact. The first paragraph talks about money and that money alludes to the second paragraph. All that is talking about is money. That paragraph is just talking about money. We can take any paragraph in here and abstract anything we wanted but that is not the intent of that paragraph.

CHIEF: So what you are saying is that if this body votes to support legislation, it can't.

CHIEF NORRIS: Yes, but it can't pay for it.

CHIEF: But we can support it.

CHIEF NORRIS: Yes, sir, you can.

CHIEF: But the way it's worded it says we can't.

CHIEF PEARSON: Any more discussions?

CHIEF: One more problem we are faced with, I think, is that the association up to this point has been able to vote on secretary/treasurer back in 1990 — the early 90s, there was two

sets of positions; a treasurer and there was a secretary. And also passed around the association at that time that the secretary/treasurer had to be a chief from Massachusetts. That was quickly pointed out that that is not true. The only thing you had to be was — the clerk had to be from Massachusetts.

So the secretary/treasurer could be from any state. Back in 1992 at that point the secretary/treasurer moved to a position out of Massachusetts and that opened up a big conflict about who was going to be secretary/treasurer. Secretary and separate treasurer. So normally nominations were made from people who were asked to submit resumes for the position.

The Board of Directors went through those resumes and selected certain members to be voted on. It was voted on by the membership and therefore done. I see no reason why that can't happen now. I don't know why the Board of Directors and the people on the committee feel that it has to be an appointed office. I think that if you're going to have — and incidentally, you are spending our money, not the Board's money. That's correct. Our money. The way I read these by-laws the annual meeting might as well not exist because there is nothing for the membership to vote on.

It leave everything up to the Board of Directors and the executive committee. I think if these are the goals as presented, they have eliminated the membership. You don't even have — we used to vote — the membership used to vote the Board of Directors. We don't even do that anymore. It's done by the individual states. So I see a very great problem with eliminating the membership from voting on anything.

CHIEF PEARSON: Thank you. Chief?

CHIEF: Mr. President, I've been a member of this organization since 1989. If my memory serves me right at that point this organization was just about broke, we had about forty thousand dollars. Dick was elected to be the secretary/treasurer. Today we have 800—thousand dollars. We are sitting in the house that this guy built. Can somebody tell me what he has done wrong that requires you to go in a different direction rather than elect another person to replace Dick when he's ready to step down to do the job?

CHIEF MORRISSEY: Once again, okay, you are focusing on an individual.

CHIEF: No, I'm focusing on the process. He was elected. Let's elect somebody else — $\,$

CHIEF MORRISSEY: Excuse me, excuse me. You just said to him — you just said — what has he done wrong? This Board had stood before you and told you he has done absolutely nothing wrong.

CHIEF: Then why change the process?

CHIEF MORRISSEY: Because the 800-thousand dollars we now have, okay, the growth of the conference, and the changing of the fire service is starting to decrease. Okay? This board put a lot of hours in giving him great consideration of what he's done. We had discussions with him, told him what we were trying to do. Let's focus on the organization as a whole and stop trying to make it a personal issue

CHIEF BASTON: Chief Baston, retired, from Yarmouth, Maine. I understand what you're saying. We've been through this process over the years. When I took over as chief back in '92 there happened to be a conflict with the existing secretary and treasurer who was the same person, David, and he happened to be elected. If Dick died tomorrow, thank God he won't, he's going to be with us tomorrow, we can still go through that process. I see no reason why the membership isn't involved in selecting the secretary/treasurer. I just think that is up to the membership, not the Board of Directors.

CHIEF PEARSON. Chief?.

CHIEF HOWARD: I'd like to have an opportunity to address everybody. I apologize for what happened earlier.

I've been a member of the organization sine 1987. Since 1993 I've served on the Board. I'm a past president. Went through the whatever, 10-11 years, on the board. Since that time I've had an opportunity to remain on the Board and currently serve as your Exhibit Chairman. Some of the things that I want everybody to understand, and I'm asking for your support, in defeating the language on the Exhibit Chairman for these reasons; the exhibit chairman will no longer be your exhibit chairman. As you have heard the individual will be the employee. One of the Board of Directors will become the Exhibit Chairman and become responsible for the show. My justification for that not changing and having an individual remain as the exhibit chairman is understand what drives this conference. The exhibit committee and the show. There is nothing else that makes the money here that drives that. The New England Association is not the only body that has a state in this issue. The Division gets their money from the show; the

mechanics get their money from the show. And you know what those contracts mean to you. That individual, my feeling is, cannot be hog-tied or not being able to make day-to-day decisions. We bring in approximately 300-thousand dollars a year for the association through the show. The individual has to make day-to-day decisions that I don't feel that — a director is going to just extend that issue. In addition to that the new exhibit person will no longer be a non-voting member of the board. So that means unless invited that individual will no longer go to board meetings. They won't be allowed because the rules and regulations don't allow that. So you're going to have the exhibit person, whoever is appointed after the show, no longer a non-voting member. Cannot attend any of your board meetings unless asked to attend or requested to attend with the exception of the combination meetings that we have with the mechanics, the vendors, and the Division. I don't believe as a 25-year member of this organization that we are going in the right direction. I disagree whole-heartedly with this Board and I would ask that you remember the work that Charlie and Linda did and you remember what Jen and I have done and why you have the money you have. Thank you.

CHIEF SELTZER: Mr. President?

CHIEF PEARSON: Yes, sir.

CHIEF SELTZER: Just to clarify, there is no intent to take anything away from Mike Howard.

CHIEF HOWARD: That's not the point here. That's not the point we're talking about.

CHIEF SELTZER: Excuse me —

CHIEF HOWARD: I've already stated my piece.

CHIEF SELTZER: Point of order, please. The chairman — it is an exhibits committee, Mike, am I correct when I say that?

CHIEF HOWARD: It is an exhibits committee.

CHIEF SELTZER: So the intention is that a board member will be the chair of that committee. All of the work that is done by the exhibits coordinator will remain the same. That person will have the authority to make the day-to-day decisions. Just because there is a committee and a chair doesn't mean that the day-to-day decisions can't be made by the person who is being paid to do that. That's why we're paying that individual. Quite frankly, Chief, I think, and I've been on the press for a couple of years but Tom was on it for quite a few years. You were the chairman for quite awhile, weren't you Tom? Working with —

CHIEF COULOMBE: Exhibits.

CHIEF SELTZER: No, on the press for development.

CHIEF COULOMBE: Oh, yes.

CHIEF SELTZER: Yes. And the Chief did all the leg work for us and we all worked together. I don't think there is any intent to make that any different with the exhibits committee. That was the intent of the by-laws change.

CHIEF HOWARD: Thank you, President Pearson. For those of you who have been around a long time, and there's many in this room that have been around a long time, the exhibit chairman's position is not the education chairman's position. It's not the golf. It's not those. The exhibit chairman's position is responsible for 300-thousand dollars in revenue and so forth. It's responsible for the organization of the Expo. That position in no capacity is equal to any of the other positions that Chief Seltzer is talking about. I think many of you here are well aware of that. Again, I would ask you to beat that by-law change.

CHIEF FLAHERTY: On the member that — the board member that would oversee the exhibits person, will they receive a salary or a stipend?

CHIEF NORRIS: No.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have had a lot of good discussion with this. I know it's a very important change. Is there anyone else who wishes to speak?

CHIEF Maurais.

CHIEF MAURAIS: Let me say a few things. I'm still confused. I don't know what's happening. I started as exhibit chair back in 1986. No money. I took over from a fire chief from Marblehead. My predecessor. I took over from him. He got me into this. I didn't know what I was getting into. I did it for nothing. It started down at Dunphy's. I believe we had maybe 25-thousand dollars that year. So from that point on I looked at Linda, we computerized it, we brought this all up. I went to the Board, I begged the Board to give me a computer on year. That was like pulling teeth. We worked hard. We put in hours and hours. They started paying me \$200 a year. And I worked this thing up to the show it is today. I brought you in multi-million dollars of revenue for this association. I don't know why you need a chairman who to me is nothing. You may be an employee at will. I was an employee as will basically. But the decisions we made, Linda and I, a lot time we put into it. Sometimes 6 or 8 hours a day sometimes, getting ready for the

show, and we made a lot of decisions. I was the chairman of the exhibit committee and I had one meeting in 20 years because every time I went to a meeting I left there more confused. They didn't know what the hell I did for the exhibits committee. So I did what I wanted to do and here we are sitting here now with 600-thousand dollars in this treasury.

And you want to destroy this thing. I'm voting against it because I can't see — this is too much for me to swallow. I'm an old guy. I've been around for years for this association. I put my heart into this thing. And to do this is too much for me to swallow. And I'll tell you what, if you don't think the chairman Dick should be a voting member? I was in a town meeting. I'm a member there. I get up and vote for my own God damn pay raise. And you won't let Dick vote on the raise and all? I'm against it. I'll tell you right now, I'm dead against it. That might be my last comment.

CHIEF MORRISSEY: Thank you very much. Just a point of information and to get to his point about voting. It is a lot to swallow. Is there any way that the by-law change chairman could separate and amendment to vote the wording changes if you think it is necessary. And then the two real major changes that I see is taking Dick's position out of a voting position and changing the exhibit chairman. Or are we just voting this as an entire package?

CHIEF PEARSON: It's already been voted on.

CHIEF COULOMBE: I think if want they can make a motion to vote on any, or part, of these. You could do them individually one by one, but I hope you don't. But I'm hearing that you might want to make a motion to split that vote into three.

CHIEF PEARSON: Chief Wood?

CHIEF WOOD: John Wood, Vermont. There are 11 members of the Board of Directors up there. I know in my state we voted to put a board member up there. I trust that board member to make the right decision based on the whole year of debate, discussions, talking with the attorney. I think every other state works the same way. You pick a board member, yo trust that board member to go on the board and work for you, for your state fire chief's association. Those people up there have been for a year working on this, debating it back and forth, the good and bad, they have talked to the attorneys. There's been quite a bit of debate today. Some of it has been more about personal issues rather than what's good for the association. We're taking

about, what I'm hearing from these people here who have been working on this program, these changes and by-laws, is that this is the best thing for us to do as an association. That's what they feel. We voted to put those people up there. I support the president and the people from Vermont that we put on that board. That person is taking a position. He stood on it. Like the other on the Board of Directors.

I'd like to move the question.

CHIEF SPURR: Second.

CHIEF PEARSON: Is there any discussion?

CHIEF WOOD: That's non debatable. You have to vote on the question.

CHIEF PEARSON: Thank you. All right, we have a motion. We have a second. Is there any discussion?

CHIEF COULOMBE: No, you just vote. If people vote it down, the discussion can continue. But they moved the question so now a vote happens.

CHIEF PEARSON: All those in favor?

(Response.)

CHIEF PEARSON: All those opposed?

(Response.)

CHIEF PEARSON: Could I see the nays, please? Five.

CHIEF MAURAIS: What was the vote for? CHIEF PEARSON: To move the question.

CHIEF COULOMBE: And you didn't get a chance to speak?

CHIEF WEHTER: No, I haven't.

CHIEF PEARSON: All right. Now a motion would be in order.

CHIEF: We have a motion on the floor.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have a motion on the floor? Do we have a second?

To approve or disapprove — there was a motion —

CHIEF: For discussion.

CHIEF PEARSON: It's open for discussion?

CHIEF: Yes.

CHIEF: No, wait a minute. There was a motion to move the question. The question was to accept the by-laws as they were presented.

CHIEF: No, ask her to read it back. There's a motion to discuss.

CHIEF WOOD: Mr. President, I made the initial motion. My motion was to bring this up for discussion.

CHIEF COULOMBE: Yes.

CHIEF: Somebody has to make a motion to accept the bylaws.

CHIEF PEARSON: Let's make a motion. Was there a motion on the floor?

CHIEF PAROW: Chief Parow, Chelmsford, Mass. Retired. I make a motion to accept the by-laws as drafted.

CHIEF: Second.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have a motion and we have a second. Now do we have any more discussion? I'm sure we will.

CHIEF: One of the things we haven't discussed at all is that there is no where in these new bylaws that the secretary/treasurer has to be from the fire service. He could be John Smith from the street that has no connection to the fire service anywhere. I think that is a dangerous move for this association to make.

CHIEF PEARSON: Thank you.

CHIEF WOOD: Mr. President, I call the question.

CHIEF: Second.

CHIEF PEARSON: Okay, we have a motion, we have a second.

CHIEF: Second.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have a second. All those in favor?

(Response.)

All those opposed?

(Response.)

Could we have a raise of hands, please, on the nos. We have 11 nays. Yeas? 32.

CHIEF PEARSON: Motion carries.

CHIEF: What was the motion?

CHIEF: What was the question?

CHIEF COULOMBE: Now we can vote.

CHIEF PEARSON: Can I have a motion?

CHIEF: Parow made the motion to accept the by-laws as presented.

CHIEF: And there was two—thirds vote.

CHIEF: We're voting on Chief Parow's recommendation.

CHIEF: He voted to move the question. Now we need a motion to accept.

CHIEF PAROW: The motion is on the floor already, I called it.

CHIEF PEARSON: He called it. We have a second.

CHIEF PAROW: This is a call to vote on the motion to accept

the by-laws as presented.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have a motion. We have a second. Any discussion?

CHIEF: No. No. No. It's closed.

CHIEF: He didn't call the question.

CHIEF: Yes, he did. Just say all those in favor. That's all you've got to do. No more discussion.

CHIEF PEARSON: All those in favor signify by saying aye.

(Response of 36.)

All those opposed?

(Response of 9.)

CHIEF PEARSON: Motion passes with two—thirds. So now where are we?

CHIEF COULOMBE: Election of officers.

CHIEF PEARSON: Election of officers. A motion would be in order for Chief Ruggles from the state of Vermont to be moved to the 2nd Vice President. May I have a motion?

CHIEF SELTZER: Chief Seltzer, Rhode Island. So moved.

CHIEF PEARSON: Thank you, Chief Seltzer.

CHIEF NORRIS: Chief Norris, Maine. Second.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have a motion and a second. All those in favor signify by saying aye.

(Response.)

Opposed?

(No response.)

So moved. Now, on to the state of Vermont Director position. And the Rhode Island Board of Directors spot. Do we need to vote on this, no? We don't need a motion, we just need someone from the two states, Vermont and Rhode Island, to announce the caucus results.

CHIEF LOCKE: Mr. President, Steve Locke from the state of Vermont. We elected Robert Gowans the Chief from Montpelier to be on the Board of Directors.

CHIEF PEARSON: Thank you. Robert, please stand up. (Applause.)

Now for Rhode Island for Chief Seltzer?

CHIEF SYLVESTER: Chief Slyvester, Lincoln, Rhode Island. I'd like to place the name of Chief Seltzer on the Board.

CHIEF PEARSON: We have a motion. Do we have a second?

CHIEF COULOMBE: There's not a motion before us.

CHIEF SYLVESTER: It's the caucus vote, Mr. President.

CHIEF PEARSON: Thank you. (Applause.)

CHIEF PEARSON: Are there any other offices we need to

MEMORIAL ADDRESS

REVEREND GARY BLUME: In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Yours is not profession. It is so much more than a job. It's a calling. And a calling implies responsibility that reaches far beyond what we expect in the normal range of a job or a career. It is a calling to serve, to serve above self.

There was a young colonel getting his first assignment on a new base and he was feeling pretty proud that he was going to have his own command. And he heard a knock on the door so he picked up his phone and he started talking on the phone and he said, "Yes, yes, General. I will tell the President when I see him." Then a private walks in. "Private, what can I do for you?" "I'm here to connect your phone."

Okay. Well, that didn't work, did it? I hope we're going in a better direction. I know it's warm and I'm not going to be long, I promise.

I'd like to share with you some of my experiences as being a fire chaplain in response to some of the occasionally negative things that we confront. When I was appointed to Bridgewater there was a very stern old captain, former Marine, Viet Nam vet, kick boxing champion of New England, one of the toughest roughest guys I have ever, ever met. As soon as I received the appointment he said, "I don't want to hear any God talk in here." Only he was a little more crass than that. "I don't want to hear any God talk." You will never hear it from me.

It was a couple of years and actually we had been to some really terrible scenes and crises, and we had gotten this new chief. And the chief was celebrating at his home. It was in the middle of winter and we were there, and John said to me, Gary, I want to talk to you. I said, Okay, talk to me. He says, No, outside. Well, the kick boxing champion of New England, but I'm not going to say no but I was wondering what he was going to say to me. So we went outside in this freezing, freezing night and he said to me, "I think I'm starting to understand this God stuff." I think about that and I tell you that and I still get goose bumps, because this was one of the toughest guys ever.

It wasn't long after that that he called and said his mother was dying and would I see her and would I do the funeral. You see we all need something to help us with that call, with this job that is more than a job. It's not a job. It's something that goes far, far beyond that. And it's how we lead. It may not be with our words, but it's the way we live. The way we treat one another. The way we act.

My second appointment for the World Trade Center, we were doing houses and our work at the morgue had been completed, but I met with the battalion chief and he was pretty upset that day. He said, "You know, Padre, I lost 28 sons." Thin about that. I look at you chiefs and I think perhaps if you had a loss like that you would feel just like this battalion chief. Because you care. Because you have a calling that is so much more than a job.

There was a young pastor who was serving his congregation and he was getting some flack from some of his parishioners. especially Mrs. Brown. Mrs. Brown didn't think he should be there. He was too young, he was still wet behind the ears, he didn't really know what he was doing. And the pastor was making some calls in the neighborhood of Mrs. Brown's and he had to park in front of her house. And so he saw a couple of other parishioners and he said, You know, if I don't go see Mrs. Brown, I know I'm going to hear about it at the next vestal meeting. I know she is going to complain. So he walked up the walk to Mrs. Brown's house and as he is walking up the walk he noticed a curtain moving just a little bit. So he went up to the door and swallowed hard and knocked on the door. There was no answer. There was no answer. So against all better judgment he got down on one knee and he peeked through the keyhole. He saw Mrs. Brown peeking out at him. So he had to open the door. Mrs. Brown said, "Well, Pastor, I guess that's the first time we ever saw eye to eye." And this young fellow said, "But you know we had to get down on our knees to do it." Think about that. Think about how we are called to serve. Think about those who have gone before us who have answered that call and now have become an inspiration to all of us. It's something to behold. Perhaps it's even called nobility.

One other example from the World Trade Center we had our turns where as chaplains we would work in the pile and some nights we would walk around the pile and have duty at the morgue, back and forth. One night I was walking along and I felt this really hard slap on my back. I thought it was one of my fellow chaplains. I turned around and it was a guy and he said, "Padre, I want you to know I don't believe in God, but I am sure glad you're here." What did that really say? What was he really telling me? What was he really saying about the power that is above and beyond all of us?

I honestly, earnestly, and most sincerely believe that there is something that leads to you this calling. It's more than a job. It's ironic to me that in Job, in the old testament, we are told about all the plights and travail in his life, Job is spelled the same way as job. And I'm sure there are days when all of you feel like Job when things aren't going right and things are going poorly and they are all askew and life doesn't seem to make any sense and I have to fight with these politicians and these people and whatever to get what we need for our service. You may feel

like Job. But even then it's more than a job. It' a calling. A calling to which you have been called. It's more than a profession. It's more than a job. It's more than a career. It's a calling. You have been led by those who have gone before, we all have been lead by those who have gone before. And they not only said those words, they lived those words.

Let us pray.

O God, we thank you for those who have gone before us, the ones that have been an example for each and every one of us. Enable us this warm evening to be inspired by their lives and their calling that truly we might understand what all this means. For it's more than just praying in Your Name, it's living in Your Name. Amen

This evening's events, and there is a schedule we're going to try to keep, we are all aware that there is a sporting event that is going on this evening. With that said, we will update you on the score. Bur more importantly there has been a lot of planning and time and effort that goes into planning these events, a lot of the chiefs who are current officers, the outgoing officers and the incoming officers, as well as everyone that is here certainly deserves the attention of this evening from all of us. So please keep that in mind as we are going through the night. We will do our best and I'll try and keep my remarks brief, but we would appreciate your attention during the presentations and the swearing—in ceremonies as well. So thank you for that.

With that I think we're going to move right to the buffet and I believe that Sheraton wait staff will be asking tables to go op. Then at some point hopefully when a few people get done, we're going to begin with presentations and keep the evening going.

So thank you very much.

(Dinner was enjoyed.)

* * PRESENTATIONS * *

CHIEF FARRELL: Good evening, everyone. The President has asked that we move on with the program. I know you're still eating dinner. We have some presentations, so we're going to begin that part of our meeting.

It is off the agenda but I did want to mention that I know all of us know Reverent Gary Blume but what I didn't know and I just found out, and many of you don't know, he received recently the Father Mychal Judge Award from Massachusetts Fire Chapter Service.

(Applause.)

CHIEF FARRELL: Just in case you're wondering, the score is 4 to 2. Detroit over Boston.

Anyway, at this point in the evening I welcome President Chief Stuart Pearson to do some presentations.

CHIEF PEARSON: Thank you, very much. Again, good evening and welcome. I'd like to thank everyone for being here tonight. If I could have the sergeant at arms please assist with some of the presentations that we have here this evening to give out.

The first one we have here, he has been a member of this association for many, many, many years. He has been involved with our education, what we put on here each and every year.

Come up here, please. For their untiring efforts and long term commitment to the Association New England Fire Rescue EMS Conference Expo presented 2013, June 22nd. Again congratulations and thank you for what you people have done to help educate the fire service here in New England.

(Applause and photo taken.)

CHIEF PEARSON: At this time I'd like to call Lt. Paul Lamoreaux to the podium. Also would Secretary/Treasurer Dick Wehter and Chief Coulombe please come to the podium to assist with this presentation.

Lieutenant, the New England Association of Fire Chiefs Distinguished Service Award. The New England Association of Fire Chiefs proudly recognizes Paul Lamoreaux Junior for his untiring efforts and long—term commitment to the Association and the New England Fire Rescue EMS Conference and Exposition.

Congratulations and thank you so much for what you have done for this organization.

(Applause.)

CHIEF PEARSON: As you were walking around if you had time to visit the show at the Exposition and also walking through the hotel you saw a picture of this gentleman here. I'd like to read something that we put together.

"This evening as we change leadership of the New England Association of Fire Chiefs we want to take a moment to remember the long—standing leader, partner and dedicated fire service individual. Mr. Bill Miller dedicated over 30 years to the New England fire service and the New England Fire Apparatus Maintenance Association. He did this to insure the safety and the engineering of today's fire equipment. Tonight I'd like to present to President Paul Lamoreaux, who is the president of the New England Fire Maintenance Association, these memory boards that we placed around the hotel and the Big E, in memory of Bill. These memory boards will then be presented to Bill's family. We thank Bill, we thank his family, for the years of service and dedication to his peers in the fire service."

(Applause.)

CHIEF LAMOREAUX: You know I don't like to talk but 13 months ago I moved on so I could do scouting with my sons. Not Mitch. Mitch is obviously here this weekend. I can tell you it was in the middle of January when I got that phone call. Dave Morrow and I went right down to Falmouth. They did everything they could, Falmouth Fire, police officers, first responders. He was in his truck heading to Wellesley. Falmouth Fire worked it. Falmouth Hospital is two miles away, just wasn't enough time to bring him back. Bill had just gotten married, remarried. He lost his wife cancer. His first wife. He had just got remarried five weeks before he died to his current wife Joanne. Miranda is going to live, his granddaughter he got last year, is going to a stay with her and she is going to raise her. Billy was the best treasurer I could ever ask for, as well as all the other board members I have.

It's been a hard six months. Most of you know, I've talked to you. Chaplain Blume, I spent more time with him that did sometimes with my wife. Maybe I'll go to Heaven. I don't know. Father Leckie, help me out, will you? I just want to thank everybody and we're going to move forward. This is going to mean a lot. His three boys and granddaughter Miranda are going to get these posters. And I'll probably be crying just as bad as they are when they receive them. So thank you very much.

(Applause.)

CHIEF FARRELL: At this point we are going to move on to Chief Seltzer. Before I begin Chief Seltzer said to me how did you get chosen to be the master of ceremonies? I actually thought that was a pretty good question because I haven't really been around here all that long although I've been active in the Rhode Island fire service for a long time. I spent 31 years total in the fire service and became a chief and in a few other positions. But I do know I was extremely grateful to be asked. I sent an email to Chief Pearson thanking him for that. These associations and the New England Association of Fire Chiefs, and other associations like this, they don't happen without a long hard struggle in the beginning to make it work. They don't happen unless all of us find a way to work with each other. Unless we find ways for succession planning and all those things that we need to do. But we all stand on someone else's shoulders when we get to these places. Not just here but also in the fire department and the fire service back home. So I really feel that

this was — I wasn't expecting it but I feel privileged to be here tonight as the master of ceremonies. So I thank you for that. I appreciate it.

(Applause.)

CHIEF FARRELL: My goal is to get a hug from Dick Wehter before the night is over. They told me — no, I'm not going to let you go. They said what are you looking for, and I said a hug from Dick Wehter. I have invited this guy to come visit me in Providence for years. He just won't come. So some people may think he doesn't like me, but I think he does. He's a good guy. I really think he does, he just doesn't want to show me that.

Anyway, over the last couple of nights we've had some great conversations, Chief Wehter and I. So we've had a good time talking to each other. At least I've had a good time, Chief.

In any case, we're going to continue on. There is a guest speaker that we have here tonight. Many of you know him, Chief Bob Seltzer, who is on the board of directors of the New England Association of Fire Chiefs. He's the chief of the Smithfield Fire Department. He's been around the fire service for a long number of years. He is extremely well respected in the state of Rhode Island. Tonight he's going to do a presentation on the Station Night Club fire, ten years later. I know that all of you know about that tragic night. Chief Pearson is going to tell you where we were, where we went, and where we are today. It's been a struggle in the state. I'm sure it's the same for all of you especially when it comes to fire codes and making sure that we keep the things we learned after the fire at the Station.

I'll ask Chief Seltzer to begin his presentation. Thank you. (Applause)

CHIEF SELTZER: Thank you.

(Chief Seltzer presented the topic, the Station Night Club Fire, Ten Years Later.)

CHIEF FARRELL: Thank you, Chief Seltzer. Those were certainly difficult. Myself, Chief Pearson, and many of you probably remember Chief Couteaux, were on the Fire Board of Appeal and Review that was redrafting all of these codes at the time. We had quite a few nasty letters and comments from a number of people but we move forward and continue to struggle. I will tell you one thing, I had never seen a reporter at the Fire Board of Review in all the time I had been there until the Tuesday after the Station Nightclub fire when all the reporters showed up. Myself and Rene and Sue and the fire people on the board, and I can remember telling them it's nice to

see you and I hope we see you back here a year from now. And one said What's a year from now? And I said that's when they try to take away everything we're going to get this year. And it's been going on now for two years, so we've been fighting to keep what we got. And we are certainly aware of all the efforts of the fire service people. Thanks.

Okay, we're going to move on to outgoing Present remarks at this time. So at this time I'd like to ask Chief Pearson the President of the New England Association of Fire Chiefs to come up.

CHIEF PEARSON: Thank you, Chief. A very tragic and very, very sad event. But I have to say there are other things that we do and have been doing and we have a small short, short video. I'm a big hockey fan, My son's are sitting over there and they're like, poppa, let's go here. So we're going to keep it going.

This is something that really really touched us in Rhode Island and something that came to do. We formed a foundation and we decided to take on a task. We started to look at our veterans, the veterans that we have in the state of Rhode Island. And we formed an honor flight. So we will get this film going and we're going to show you a little video of what we did a little while ago. This is what we call our Alpha Flight.

(A video was played.)

(Applause)

CHIEF PEARSON: Thank you. The Honor Flight still continues to go strong in Rhode Island. We are working on our Charlie Flight. We know that we lose many, many, many veterans every single day in the United States. We are proud to say that in September we will be taking 65 veterans to Washington to take them through the Washington Memorial. Thank you. A donation was made by the New England Association of Fire Chiefs to the Honors Flight earlier this year and I wanted to show you that presentation so you could see what you're doing and what your money does.

Over the year this is one of the things we started, but working with the men and women here in the association, and the partners and whatnot, has been such an honor and a pleasure. We have pulled together this year and accomplished to goals that we were trying to reach. And we stayed as a pact, we stayed tight. It has been such a pleasure for me to be able to stand here and go through the years and then become your president and move forward with what we have done this past year.

I think I need to say thank you first of all to my family. To my wife Ruth thank you for putting up with me, dealing with me, going through all these things, and my family for supporting me. Without the support of my family I wouldn't be able to move on. Again, thank you.

And the people in this room, the board of directors, thank you so much for what you have done, supported me, listened to me, gave me guidance, and listened to me and gave me more guidance. And my friends, my friends that always came and helped me and supported me and stood behind me. Thank you to you too. I know there are other people in this room I probably — if I didn't say thank you, I say thank you to all of you. I'm going to miss someone. I don't know how many more names I can go through.

Butch, moving forward I wish you the best of luck. I know the association is in fine shape with you at the helm. I know that you will take the rudder and steer us straight. And again I know you are going to do a fine job. And to you and your family, too, congratulations on becoming the new president.

So I think in moving forward a little I'd like to call up Chief Varney from the IAFC and the 1st Vice President William Metcalf.

CHIEF FARRELL: I think at this time we will all the outgoing presidents' remarks. Thanks to Chief Pearson for his. We're going to have Chief Dave Sayles, President of New England Division of the IAFC make his remarks now.

CHIEF SAYLES: Good evening. I had a moment to talk with Stu one more time. It probably cut the time I had at the podium down to about 30 seconds. Every time talked to him he said that's too much time, squeeze it down, squeeze it down. I want to tell you I was very pleased to give all of my time to have that opportunity for all of you to see the club flights and that video itself. The reason why I'm delighted that everybody saw it is I think that we all need to be socially responsible. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the partners who today accumulated over 100 pounds of toiletries that are going to be donated to a local church. I want to thank Chief Flaherty and his wife for facilitating that. Ruth and Valeria, keep up the good work. Make sure we are all socially responsible.

I thought today about what I would say this evening and I reflected back about a song that my grandson was playing, a theme song from Forrest Gump. I forget the song, the forgot the

movie and I went back and I watched that movie. What a great movie. That movie taught us all a lot of lessons. It taught us dedication to duty. It taught us about loyalty. Just ask Lt. Dan about loyalty. Lt. Dan will tell you in Forrest Gump.

As I stand here before you I stand amongst a group of people who are dedicated, loyal to duty, loyal to one another, and obvious from last evening's show and this afternoon — or this evening's show, dedicated to your families. I was delighted to see the number of children last night. I'm delighted to see you here this evening. In closing I want to thank each and every one of you for supporting me throughout the year. I hope that you all continue to support Mike Varney and Butch. Keep it rolling.

In conclusion I want to thank my family for putting up with me for a number of years and in particular not being home. I'm sure all you ladies sitting out there recognize that. Thank you and good evening.

(Applause.)

CHIEF FARRELL: Thank you very much to Chief Pearson and Chief Sayles for all of their efforts on behalf of the Association and the Division over the last year. Both of these chiefs are very good friends to me and have been extremely helpful to the Rhode Island fire service as well. Besides the Honor Flight the Rhode Island Association of Fire Chiefs formed the foundation and under the last few years under their leadership as well as the years they were presidents of the Association and our own Fire Chiefs Association, we build fire academies and a number of other wonderful things. It all happens and all continues to build one on top of the other. It is through the support and efforts of the fire service in general.

At this point we are going to come to a great part of the evening, the swearing in of the new presidents. We will hear remarks from those presidents as well. We will begin, following our agenda, and I'd like to ask Chief Michael Varney to please come up and be sworn in as president. I believe Chief Wall is going to do the swearing in.

SWEARING IN CEREMONY

CHIEF WALL: Good evening. Tim Wall with the North Farms Volunteer Fire Department. It is a distinguished and honored pleasure to swear in the next president of the New England Division of the IAFC. As you can see the presenters and officers thanking their families. So at this time I'd like Mr. Varney, Mike's father, who is in Mike's fire department to come up and be with Mike on stage, please.

CHIEF VARNEY: I Mike Varney hereby swear and affirm that I will support the constitution and by—laws and at all times bear true allegiance to the goals and purposes of the New England Division of the International Association of Fire Chiefs. I further swear to perform the duties and responsibilities of my office to the best of my ability. So help me God.

CHIEF WALL: Congratulations Chief Mike Varney, President. (Applause.)

CHIEF VARNEY: Before I make any remarks the first thing I have to do is certainly recognize my predecessor, a very good friend of mine who has become a good friend over the last decade serving on the board. And that would be Chief David Sayles. So, Dave, if you can make your way back up to the stage.

(Applause)

CHIEF VARNEY: Dave, I have a small token of our appreciation from the New England Division of the International Association of Fire Chiefs recognizing President David Sayles for the last year, 2012 to 2013. This is in recognition of Dave's leadership over the past year. In addition to doing all the day—to—day business of the Division Dave accomplished two significant items over the past year, one of which was updating our division's strategic plan for the upcoming several years, and the other was leading a team to coordinate a series of educational seminars held throughout New England to address response and planning to school shootings and emergency planning. Thank you gain, Dave.

CHIEF SAYLES: Thank you.

(Applause.)

CHIEF SAYLES: I'll make my comments brief as I have been told twelve times before I got up here. I told them I only had two pages and they took my Power Point away from me. I need to thank all of my brother fire fighters and fire chiefs from Connecticut, the New England Division, and my blood brothers from the state of Maine since I'm a full—blooded Mainiac. Most of you know that already. I look forward to building on the relationships we built through the New England organizations over the past years and I look forward to my direction from the Board down to the New England Association to the state associations, and the local fire departments within New England. Basically I have two terms I want people to remember

(Applause).

CHIEF FARRELL: Thank you, Chief. I don't know why they keep pointing at me about keeping these things short, I'm just following the orders and directions of my superiors here who told me to try and keep the remarks brief. I think on a personal note, and this evening is certainly not about me, some of the best part of my career has been in the last two years when I was a member of the board of directors of the New England Division of the International Association of Fire Chiefs. A great bunch of guys and their wives all love me as well. I really did have a great couple of years with everybody who was involved. So thank you for that.

Chief, congratulations and I'm sure you're going to have a great year. You're a brilliant guy and I had a good time learning from you as well over the last couple of years. Next on the agenda we are going to swearing in of President Chief Morrill for the New England Association of Fire Chiefs and he is being sworn in tonight by Chief Thomas Lambert.

SWEARING IN CEREMONY

CHIEF LAMBERT: This is certainly an honor and a pleasure for me to be able to do this for Butch whereas I was probably one of the ones who helped convince him that this was a good direction to steer his energies and I'm certainly proud that he's made it to the position that he has.

Raise your right hand, please.

CHIEF MORRILL: I Philip Morrill hereby swear that I will support the constitution and by—laws and at all times bear true allegiance to the goals and purposes of the New England Association of Fire Chiefs, Incorporated. I further swear to

perform the duties and responsibilities of my office to the best of my ability. And at the end of my term of office I will deliver to my successor all records of said office, so help me God.

CHIEF LAMBERT: Congratulations (Applause.)

CHIEF MORRILL: Thank you, Tom. My first act is, if I could have Chief Pearson and Ruth as well, please. On behalf of the Association, its members, its directors, its officers for the great job both of you have done not only this year but in many previous year, along with your love of travel, we want you to have this certificate and we want you to have warm winds and fair travels wherever you roam.

(Applause.)

CHIEF MORRILL: A couple other things that have to be done tonight is we had a little glitch in the annual meeting in swearing in two of our new officers; First Vice President Jack Casner and Second Vice President Troy Ruggles if we can get them to stand. Apparently my first official act is to swear them into office.

(The swearing—in oaths were taken.)

(Applause.)

CHIEF MORRILL: I was told to keep it short.

CHIEF FARRELL: No, I didn't.

CHIEF MORRILL: I did get it down to about 32 pages. It shouldn't be too bad.

While the sergeants at arms are handing out some pamphlets I have some, in my opinion very important, guests here this evening that I would like to introduce.

First, a great contingent from New Hampshire which is one of the bigger New Hampshire turn—outs that I've seen from my peers in several years, along with state of New Hampshire's new president of the New Hampshire Fire Chiefs Association Jay Lyon and I appreciate him coming down to witness this.

Also without the support of our communities none of us would be here this evening and I would like to at this time say thank you to my town manager David Owen, along with his wife Mary, the chair of my Board of Selectmen Sarah Silk, and the Vice Chairman Linda Murray, thank you all very much. Without your support this couldn't happen.

At the next table some of my staff. Deputy Chief Tom Zotti; he's the one who covers for me most of the time but as you can see he's here with me this evening. I have two company officers

here, two gentlemen that as we all know are the backbone of our fire service, the company officer Lieutenant Jim Dearborn and his wife Traci, Lieutenant Andre De Beer and his wife Aynne. Then we have the person that keeps our schedule in line and provides a smile in the workplace most of the time, our administrative assistant Sherri Moore and her husband Sgt. Scott Moore. Moving on to my closer family I have my two daughters here; Trisha Brian and her husband Chris, and my two grandchildren Jacob and Caitlyn, who is doing a little snoring at the present time. My daughter Andrea Ouellette and her husband Chris. It does get confusing. And my oldest grandson Aidan.

Last but always first in my book, my wife, my confidant, my best friend, your new first lady Roxana.

(Applause.)

CHIEF MORRILL: Thank you, it is a privilege and honor to stand here before you this evening. I promise to keep my remarks brief. Since I have a somewhat captive audience and on behalf of your new First Lady, I would like to remind all spouses and significant others of board members that you are not only welcome but encouraged to join and participate with the partners committee. The partners committee is always looking for fresh ideas as they plan the events that are provided during the Conference. Feel free to contact Roxana or attend a quarterly meeting with your board member.

I would like to speak to mentoring and the encouragement that has led me to this podium tonight. As with most of us my parents had a big influence on my direction in life. Coming from a family with nine brothers and sisters you can imagine that it was sometimes difficult for them to provide material things. However, my mother in her wisdom told me, Son, work hard, be fair, and someday you may grow up to be the president. Little did I know?

When I was 12 or 13 years old my dad was a captain on the volunteer fire department in Wolfeboro. This is where I met Fire Chief Guy L. Foss. As one of a group of young teenagers that visited the fire station on a regular basis. Guy encouraged us that when we turned 14 years of age to get our working papers — which were required at that time, I don't know if they are today or not — and he would allow us to respond to woods fires when the fires were blue box 2. Several of us did just that and Guy took time to show us proper use of equipment and gave us

the training we needed. Guy was always a friend and mentor of youth in the community and appropriately has a recreation area in town named after him. Guy was Chief of Department from 1946 through 1974. Guy was also the 38th president of the New England Association of Fire Chiefs.

Following high school, I enjoyed a six-year tour of duty in the United States Marine Corps. Many of you realize the amount of mentoring that goes on during military service, as well as learning discipline, unity and development of a can—do attitude. The Marines motto is Semper Fidelis or Semper fi for short meaning always faithful.

In 1975 I joined the call fire department as a way to provide a service to the community. I worked closely with then Assistant Chief Charles "Zip" Foss, a person that always took the time to work with the younger members and encourage them to pursue a fire service career. Chief Foss was instrumental in me being hired to a full time position in 1979. Zip was Chief of Department from 1976 through 1992. Zip was also the 62nd President of the New England Association of Fire Chiefs.

Following Zip's retirement during 1992, Wolfeboro hired their first Fire Chief from the outside. The new chief came on board and began to acquire the latest equipment and assured that the latest in training was available. This Chief was the person that encouraged me to join fire related organizations such as this one. He also endorsed participation in other groups to stay up to date with current trends in the fire service. This person was Chief Michael J. Howard, Chief of Department from 1992 through 1999. Mike was the New England Association of Fire Chiefs 80th President. He is not here this evening but I thanked him for his service.

One other chief that not only recruited me to the board but encouraged me to continue to move forward within this organization has sworn me in this evening, our 86st President Chief Thomas Lambert, Thanks Tom. I appreciate that.

For those of you that have been following along may not have realized how much the small Town of Wolfeboro, New Hampshire has contributed to the New England Association of Fire Chiefs. Wolfeboro has a year round population of approximately 7000, a beautiful town on the shores of Lake Winnipesaukee. We draw a population upward of 20,000 people during the summer months. My research for this evening indicated that there have been 91 presidents from throughout the New England States, 12 of them

from the State of New Hampshire and now 4 from the Town of Wolfeboro. That means that one third of the New Hampshire Chiefs to serve as your president came from the same small community and I am extremely proud to follow in their footsteps. My research also indicated that the Town of Wolfeboro has the only two brothers to have served as the president of this association.

It is up to all of us to continue to encourage and mentor the younger members of our departments to not only join but to be active within our communities, states and country. I am extremely encouraged by the professionalism of the members of this and our partner organizations that we will continue to grow and move forward with our mission providing a service to the New England area in a professional and meaningful way. I am convinced that following the direction set by previous boards and with the assistance of Vice president Casner and Vice President Ruggles, other members of the board of directors, and our partner organizations we will be able to accomplish that mission.

To conclude I say thank you and Semper Fi. (Applause.)

CHIEF FARRELL: Thank you, Chief. I just wanted the chiefs to know and the presidents to know that as much as it's great to see him, it's actually greater to see Roxane because I scared the life out of her today as she was coming off an elevator. She can tell you the story. We came around the corner and it was pretty interesting for both of us but it was much worse for her, I can assure you of that.

In any case moving on at this point I think they want to do the golf raffle. Chief Flaherty, please.

CHIEF FLAHERTY: We had our golf tournament on Wednesday. It was a beautiful day. We had about 110 golfers. Some of the people I'd like to thank are Katie Coulombe, she's there every year, sitting at a hole collecting money for the 50/50 raffle.

Some of the prizes that we have tonight were donated by these people: Harold Rotor from LW Bills, Chris Rhodes from Primevent, David Hall, the golf pro at Raceway Country Club, Mark Grabowski from Complete Restoration Services, and I'd like to thank all of our vendors and the sponsors for our holes during the tournament.

I'll just get right to the raffle. (The raffle was conducted.)

CHIEF FLAHERTY: Thanks to everybody who played. We look forward to seeing you next year.

* * RECOGNITION OF PAST PRESIDENTS * *

CHIEF FARRELL: Thank you, Chief. Now on to a very important part of the evening, the recognition of all past presidents, everybody who spoke tonight. I just spoke about the leadership of the association and what that has meant, and leadership of the division. So everyone who has been a president of this organization, please stand and be recognized.

(Applause.)



BYLAWS NEW ENGLAND ASSOCIATION OF FIRE CHIEFS, INC.

As amended June 20, 2013

ARTICLE I ORGANIZATION AND PURPOSE

Section 1. This organization shall be known as the New England Association of Fire Chiefs, Incorporated.

Section 2. The purpose for which the corporation is formed, and its mission, is as follows:

- A. To operate as a non-profit corporation; to encourage and cooperate in the development of new techniques, equipment and practices to improve public safety regarding fire prevention and control; to promote more effective organizations and functions of the firefighting services including Municipal Fire Departments, with a view toward greater protection of life and property from the dangers of fire and other related hazards.
- B. To aid in the dissemination of information among the Fire Chiefs of New England concerning: newly developed equipment and procedures for fighting fires and carrying out the other functions of the Fire Departments; special hazards and problems presented by the development of new industrial and scientific processes and equipment; disasters caused by natural or human origin; practices in particular areas in the administration of Fire Departments; other matters affecting and concerning the Fire / Rescue/EMS services.
- C. To provide the means for: an exchange of ideas between its members; conducting of conferences between the members and with those having specialized knowledge on particular matters affecting the Fire/Rescue/EMS services; and the study of matters by its committees.
- D. To provide facilities and operate testing grounds for the display, demonstration and testing of equipment required and techniques of operation used in the Fire/Rescue/EMS services.
- E. To cooperate with the manufacturers and dealers in equipment used in the Fire/Rescue/EMS services with a view toward the dissemination of information to the Fire/Rescue/EMS services on the various devices available, and the development of better and more standardized equipment.
- F. To represent the interests of those in the profession of Firefighting/Rescue/EMS before legislative and other bodies considering matters in which they are concerned to the extent permitted by organizations exempt from taxation under Internal Revenue Code Section 501 (c) (3).
- G. To make charitable donations, including memorial and sickness remembrances, to members and their families, and other persons and communities who suffer financial hardships and losses through death, sickness, injury, conflagrations, and catastrophes as permitted under the provisions of I.R.C. 501 (c) (3).
- H. Any request for a donation to a candidate running for office in a tax exempt organization connected with the mission of the NEAFC must be submitted to the Board of Directors for a recommendation to the Annual Meeting at least thirty (30) days prior to said meeting.

I. To receive gifts, and bequests, raise such monies and own such real property as is necessary for the advancement of the foregoing purposes.

ARTICLE II MEANING OR INTENT

Section 1. Whenever required to effectuate the meaning or intent herein, the singular shall include the plural, the masculine shall include the feminine, and vice-versa.

ARTICLE III - THE OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the corporation shall consist of President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Secretary/Treasurer, Clerk and six State Directors, one from each of the six New England States. Candidates for the elected positions of President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, and State Director, shall make their intentions known that they are a candidate for office by submitting their candidacy to the Secretary/ Treasurer no less than ninety (90) days prior to the Annual Meeting for posting in the conference brochure or other mailing at least sixty (60) days prior to the Annual Meeting. All officers, except the State Directors, shall hold their office for one year. The offices of President, First vice president, Second Vice President will be on a rotation basis from the six New England States (Maine, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, New Hampshire, Connecticut, and Vermont) unless otherwise voted by the members at the Annual Meeting. The President, the First Vice President, Second Vice President shall be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting. In order to ensure the continuity of the organization the First Vice President and the Second Vice President shall ascend to the next higher position upon the creation of a vacancy (due to the end of a term, a voluntary separation or removal of an officer) this shall be confirmed by an affirmative vote of all State Directors. All Officers shall be active members in accordance with Article VII Section 1a when elected to office.

Section 2. Executive Board shall consist of the President, First Vice President, Second Vice President and the Immediate Past President ("Executive Officers"). The Executive Board shall have the power to act on behalf of the Board of Directors between meetings and its actions shall be reported to the Board of Directors at the next board meeting for ratification and approval.

ARTICLE IV - THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall consist of the (6) State Directors and the (4) Executive Officers. Each Director shall serve until his successor is duly elected.

The Board shall meet at such a time and place as may be designated by the President. The actual expenses of the board, which includes travel at a mileage set by the Board of Directors each year, shall be paid by the corporation. Each member of the board shall have one vote, the holding of more than one office notwithstanding.

Section 2. A candidate for election as a State Director must be an active member in accordance with Article VII Section 1a and a resident of the particular

state, which said Director, will represent. He shall be nominated and elected by the NEAFC members eligible to vote (five bugle Chief of Department/District (Active), and Honorary Life Chiefs) of that state. Directors shall serve for a term of three (3) years or until their successor is duly elected. The term of the Directors shall be staggered so that not more than one-third of the Directors are elected in any one year.

Each State Director shall request an eligibility list of qualified voters from the Secretary/Treasurer prior to holding an election. The election of Directors will be at the respective states caucus held during the Annual Meeting with the results announced at the Annual Meeting.

All Active and honorary Life Members shall be eligible to vote for the elective offices of their respective states.

Section 3. Action without a Meeting. Any action that may be taken at a meeting of the Board of Directors may be taken without a meeting if written consent setting forth the action is signed by all Directors and is filed with the minutes of the proceedings of the Board. Such consent shall have the same effect as a unanimous vote at the meeting of the Board of Directors.

Section 4. Telephonic Meetings. One or more directors may participate in a meeting of the Board of Directors by means of conference telephone or similar communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other. Participation in a meeting pursuant to this Section shall constitute presence in person at the meeting.

ARTICLE V - DUTIES

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the corporation, the Board of Directors, and the Executive Committee. The President shall be the official representative and spokesman of the Association subject to the approval of the Board of Directors... He shall call special meetings of the Board of Directors when so requested by the majority of the Board of Directors or whenever he deems such a meeting is necessary, provided that a minimum of a three day notice of said meeting shall be given and the reasons therefore. The President shall appoint all committees and appointees with the approval of the Board of Directors. Appointees as defined in Article X, Sections 1 and 2, may be an Honorary Life Member. He shall perform such other duties as may be incidental to the office.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the First Vice President to perform the duties of the President during his absence. He shall assist the President in conducting the business and policies of the Corporation and perform such other duties as prescribed by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The Second Vice President shall assist the President and First Vice President to perform the duties of their offices and in the absence of the President and the First Vice President, assume all the duties and responsibilities of the President.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Secretary/Treasurer to keep a complete record of the proceedings of special and annual meetings of the corporation, the meetings of the Board of Directors; and the standing committees, of which he

shall be an ex-officio member; to receive and answer all communications pertaining to the corporation; cause to be prepared a full report of the proceedings of each annual meeting, which shall be printed and one or more copies, made available to each member of the corporation. He shall receive all communications, contributed papers on topics, etc., designed to be presented to the meeting. He shall collect all monies due the corporation. Any committee collecting monies shall, no less than weekly, transmit said monies to the. Secretary/Treasurer. The Secretary/Treasurer shall have the custody of the funds of the corporation; he shall keep a true account of all monies received and disbursed; pay all bills and at the Annual Meeting of the corporation and before all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors, make a full and correct report of the same. He shall also employ such assistance as he may need for the collection of dues at the annual meeting and report the proceedings of the same and other such expenditures for clerical assistance at other times as may be approved by the Board of Directors. He shall execute a bond to the corporation in the sum of One million (\$1,000,000.00) dollars to be approved by the Board of Directors, the expense of procuring the same to be borne by the corporation.

The Secretary/Treasurer shall be appointed by the Executive Board with the approval of the Board of Directors. He shall perform such other duties as assigned to him by the President and/or the Executive Board. Neither he nor any Officer shall assume any indebtedness exceeding One Thousand (\$1000.) Dollars without the approval of the Board of Directors. The Secretary/Treasurer shall be a paid employee of the corporation and shall be considered an employee at will. A pay schedule will be determined by the Executive Board and approved by the Board of Directors.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to transact all the business of the corporation during the time intervening between the annual meetings. They shall have the full power to expunge from the minutes before printing, anything, which is objectionable to the corporation or its members.

Section 6. The Board of Directors shall fill any vacancies occurring by death or otherwise during the time from one Annual Meeting to another and the replacement shall be chosen from the state involved after conferring with the last President of the NEAFC from that state; and may vote by a two thirds of the total number of Directors remove any officer for cause. A quorum of six (6) Directors or two thirds of the acting Directors whichever is less shall be required to transact any business. The Board of Directors shall meet as necessary at a time, place, and date(s) set by the President or a majority vote of the Board of Directors.

Section 7. The Clerk of the corporation shall be appointed annually by the Board of Directors and shall be the director residing in Massachusetts. The clerk shall also serve as the resident agent for the corporation and perform the duties required under the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for corporations.

ARTICLE VI - ANNUAL MEETING

Section 1. The Annual Meeting of the corporation shall be held each year at such date and place designated by the Board of Directors. Proposals of sites for

the Annual Meeting or conference shall be forwarded to the Secretary/Treasurer not less than sixty days prior to the start of the Annual Meeting by a member of the association or a company or corporation in business for this purpose. Proposals shall describe the features of the site, amenities and services to be provided and the cost that would be applicable for the current year that the proposal was presented. The cost information is for comparison purposes only. All site proposals shall be investigated by a site committee as appointed by the President. Proposed sites must be at a fully sprinklered facility and a facility in full compliance with state fire codes. This committee shall submit all information relative to the proposals to the Secretary/Treasurer for disposition as provided above.

Section 2. A special meeting of the corporation may be called by the Board of Directors upon at least ten (10) days notice by mail to the members, said notice stating the time, place and purpose of said special meeting.

Section 3. Any exhibits and/or apparatus display shall at all times be under the sole control of the Exhibit Committee under such rules as the Board of Directors may adopt.

Section 4. A registration fee shall be charged every member registering at the Annual Meeting, the amount to be determined by the Board of Directors. A registration fee shall also be charged every non-member registering at the Annual Meeting, the amount to be determined by the Board of Directors. Entrance to the exhibit hall or educational sessions will require a registration badge or a day pass.

Section 5. The Board of Directors shall have full power to levy an assessment and collect from the members an amount sufficient to cover the entire expense of the Annual Meeting.

Section 6. All proposed changes in the Bylaws and/or any resolution to be presented at the Annual Meeting of the corporation shall be forwarded to, the By-Law Committee no later than February 15th unless waived by a vote of the Board of Directors. All proposals shall made available to each member (in good standing), not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. All proposals shall be posted in the vicinity of the registration area. A special meeting of the corporation shall be held on the first full day of the Annual Meeting at which time the proposals shall be read. The proposals shall be voted on at the Annual Meeting. A 2/3 vote of the members present and entitled to vote and voting shall be necessary for adoption. The membership by majority vote may request a secret ballot.

Section 7. During the conference which may include the Annual Meeting, a portion of the conference shall be set apart for the holding of a memorial service in the memory of departed members at an appropriate time and setting as designated by the Association Chaplains and approved by the Board of Directors.

Section 8. Nomination and election of officers shall be by secret ballot at the Annual Meeting. All officers elected will be installed at a time and place designated by the Board of Directors and shall swear to the following oath of office: "I, (name) hereby swear that I will support the Constitution and Bylaws and at all times bear allegiance to the goals and purposes of the New England Association of Fire Chiefs, Inc. I further swear to perform the duties and

responsibilities of my office to the best of my ability and at the end of my term of office, I will deliver to my successor all records of said office, so help me God."

Section 9. Reports of all committees will be presented at the Annual Meeting. The Secretary/Treasurer shall prior to the next Annual Meeting arrange for the distribution to all members of a summary of the activities of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VII - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership shall consist of:

A. Active Members:

- (1) The Chief of the Fire Department of a regularly organized public fire department;
- (2) Chief of a private Fire Department that provides municipal service;
- (3) Chief of an industrial Fire Department;
- (4) State Fire Marshal;
- (5) Full time employed Fire Commissioners;
- (6) Fire Directors

B. Associate Members:

- (1) City or Town Officials, Fire Commissioners, Assistant or Deputy Chiefs or members of fire departments, individuals and individuals representing firms and corporations interested in the protection of life and property against fire.
- (2) Associate members shall be entitled to all the privileges of membership in the corporation except the right to vote and as otherwise provided in these By-Laws.

C. Honorary Life Members:

(1) Honorary Life Members shall be entitled to vote on all matters. Honorary Life Members shall be entitled to all privileges of an active member except as otherwise provided in these By-Laws. Honorary Life Members shall not be required to pay annual dues; however, the Board of Directors may assess Honorary Life Members a fee to cover mailing costs. Honorary Life Membership may be conferred upon active members upon their retirement from office, provided they have been active members of the corporation or its predecessor, The New England Association of Fire Chiefs for a period of five years immediately preceding the date of their retirement, and provided further that they are not identified with fire protection from a commercial standpoint. Honorary Life membership will be withdrawn in the event the member becomes identified with fire protection from a commercial standpoint, but may be reinstated by making application to the corporation and receiving a positive vote at an annual meeting.

D. Life Membership:

- (1) Individuals, firms and corporations interested in protection of life and property against fire, shall be eligible for life membership upon payment of the fee established in the fee schedule. The Board of Directors may assess Life Members a fee to cover mailing cost.
- (2) Life Members shall be entitled to all the privileges of membership in the corporation except the right to vote and as otherwise provided in these By-Laws.

Section 2. No member who is in arrears for dues and assessments shall be entitled to vote at any meeting of the corporation, and any member who is in arrears on June 1st shall receive a second notice and if still in the arrears on August 1st he shall be dropped from membership.

Section 3. Dues and Fees Schedule: Dues and fees for Active, Associate, Honorary Life, and Life Members shall be set by the Board of Directors and voted on by the membership at the next annual meeting.

Section 4. Application for all classes of membership shall be received by the Secretary/Treasurer. The proposed member has to be sponsored by a member in good standing with the corporation. The Secretary/Treasurer shall after investigation approve or disapprove the application except as otherwise provided in these By-Laws. If a question of eligibility arises, a decision to approve or disapprove shall be determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 5. The Secretary/Treasurer shall not register or give a badge or extend any courtesies of the annual meeting to any member whose dues and assessments are not paid to date in full.

Section 6. No member shall be expelled from the membership by vote of less than two thirds (2/3) of the membership present at the Annual Meeting, nor of a vote of less than 30 members present and voting on such expulsion.

Section 7. Code of Ethics with Guidelines

The mission of the New England Association of Fire Chiefs (N.E.A.F.C.) is to pursue the protection of life and property by leadership, education, and support for its members and affiliate organizations. N.E.A.F.C. members and appointees have a special responsibility to the community, as well as legal and ethical obligations ensuing from service.

These responsibilities impose duties inherent to the fire service, including the promotion and protection of public trust and confidence, avoidance of conflicts of interest and appearances of impropriety, as well as careful and informed management of public finances. These duties must at all times guide the conduct of all N.E.A.F.C. members and appointees.

Conflict of Interest – A conflict of interest refers to situations in which private interests or personal considerations may compromise a chief officer's judgment and his or her responsibility to act in the best interest of the fire service. Members should always hold themselves to the highest standard of personal integrity by avoiding all conflicts of interest or the appearance of the same.

Appropriate Conduct - The N.E.A.F.C. expects all members to maintain the highest standards of professionalism, judgment, maturity and personal integrity; to comply with all applicable laws; and to treat others with dignity and respect.

Equal Opportunity - All decisions pertaining to hiring practices, volunteer recruitment, appointments, pay adjustments, promotions, and discipline should prohibit discrimination because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, sexual orientation, political affiliation, disability, age or marital status.

Anti-Harassment and Non-Discrimination - The N.E.A.F.C. believes that all employees and volunteers have the right to work in an environment where everyone can achieve their full potential without being impeded by discrimination

or harassment. Members should have no tolerance for acts of inappropriate and illegal discriminatory behaviors in the fire and emergency service.

Partnerships/Relationships - Members should develop and maintain a healthy partnership/relationship for the purpose of improving the quality of life for fire service personnel and the citizens that they serve.

Wellness-Fitness - The N.E.A.F.C. supports the Wellness-Fitness-Safety Initiative. Members have a responsibility to adopt policies to maintain fit, healthy and capable fire fighters and EMS personnel.

Personal Information and Privacy - Members should strive to protect employee/volunteer privacy interests and to prevent inappropriate disclosures of information from an employee or volunteer's personnel record.

Outside Employment - Members should not engage in, solicit, negotiate for, or promise to accept private employment, nor should they render services for private interests or conduct a private business when such employment, service, or business creates a conflict with or impairs the proper discharge of their official duties. Members shall not engage in outside work or business activities that runs contrary to the central mission of the organization and damages the Associations reputation with the general public.

Use of Department Property Internet - Use of Association property is limited to the conduct of official business and uses that are allowed to the general public.

Internet, E-mail and Voice Mail - Internet access, e-mail and voice mail are provided for business use. Incidental and appropriate personal use is permissible.

Public Speech - The N.E.A.F.C. respects the rights of members for personal self-expression. However, members who identify themselves as employees/volunteers of their departments in public communications must make it clear that the views expressed are their own and do not necessarily reflect the views of their departments or the N.E.A.F.C.

Confidential Information - Members should not disclose to others, or use to further their personal interest, confidential information acquired by them in the course of their official duties.

Impression of Influence - N.E.A.F.C. members should conduct their official and personal affairs in a manner that avoids any impression of influence and disclose any personal relationships that may give the impression of influence. Members should not accept gifts, money, discounts or favors including a benefit to family members, friends or business associates if the gift could be reasonably inferred or expected that the gift was intended to influence them in the performance of their official duties, or acceptance of the gift is forbidden by state or local law or Association policy.

Personal Appearance - Members are expected to dress in a clean and neat manner appropriate to their job responsibilities and consistent with the standards of professional, appearance and dress.

Political Activities - N.E.A.F.C. members generally are entitled to exercise their rights to hold membership in or support a political party; to participate in political campaigns; to vote; and express their opinions on political campaigns; to

vote; and express their opinions on political subjects or candidates. Members should not, however, participate in political activity during the scheduled workday. Likewise members should not participate in political activity as a representative of the N.E.A.F.C..

E. Special Honorary Life Membership maybe conferred by approval of the Board of Directors for Associate/Vendor members.

ARTICLE VIII - AMENDMENTS OF BY-LAWS

Section 1. This corporation shall have full power at a meeting called for that purpose, to alter, amend or repeal these By Laws, but the same shall not be done except by a vote of two thirds (2/3) of the members present and entitled to vote at said meeting. The membership by majority vote can request a secret ballot. However, no such proposed amendment shall be considered that has not been read and posted as provided in Article VI, Section 6.

ARTICLE IX - RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The presiding officer shall preserve order and decorum. All questions of order shall be decided by him, subject to appeal by any member to the parliamentarian.

Section 2. In a decision of any question coming before the annual meeting for which no provisions are made in the Bylaws, the presiding officer shall be governed by the rules laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 3. Every member, when he speaks or offers a motion, shall rise in his place, properly identify himself, and respectfully address the presiding officer and when finished shall resume his seat. He shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoid all improper personal references and indecorous language.

Section 4. When two or more members shall rise to speak at the same time, the presiding officer shall decide who shall have the floor.

Section 5. A member called to order by the presiding officer shall immediately cease speaking on the question before the house, and shall not resume his remarks until the question is settled.

ARTICLE X - STANDING COMMITTEES AND APPOINTEES

Section 1. Appointees

Members appointed as Sergeant-at-Arms, Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms and Parliamentarian shall be an Active Chief or Honorary Life Member Chief. Clergy appointed as Association Chaplains shall have no membership status.

Section 2 Standing Committees

A. Advertising, Audit, By-Laws, Professional Development, Exhibit, Financial, Memorial Service, Red Book, Conference Format Committee, Registrations

B. The chairman of each standing committee shall be a current Director or Officer of the Association.

C. The President with the approval of the Board of Directors may from time to time establish "working groups" intended to meet the organizations needs.

Section 3. The Past President, the First Vice President, and the Second Vice President shall constitute the Auditing Committee. The Auditing Committee will see that an outside auditing firm has audited the books each year before the annual meeting and shall review the results of the audit with the auditor and recommend to the Board of Directors any changes in accounting practices or procedures recommended by the auditor.

ARTICLE XI - INDEMNIFICATION

Indemnification. Except as otherwise provided in this Section, the Corporation shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless any director, officer, or employee of the Corporation who was or is a party, or is threatened to be made a party, to a threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding (whether civil, criminal, administrative, or investigative, and whether formal or informal) as provided herein. The Corporation shall indemnify the director, officer, or employee against expenses, including attorneys' fees, judgments, penalties, fines and amounts paid in settlement, actually and reasonably incurred by such person in connection with the action, suit or proceeding. The Corporation shall indemnify a director, officer, or employee only if the person acted in good faith, with the care an ordinarily prudent person in a like position would exercise under similar circumstances, and in a manner that the person reasonably believed to be in the interests of the Corporation. With respect to a criminal action or proceeding, the person must have had no reasonable cause to believe that his or her conduct was unlawful. To the extent that the director, officer, or employee or of the Corporation has been successful on the merits or otherwise in defense of an action, suit or proceeding, or in defense of any claim, issue or other matter in the action, suit or proceeding, the director, officer, or employee shall be indemnified against the actual and reasonable expenses, including attorneys' fees, incurred by him or her in connection with the action, suit or proceeding, and any action, suit or proceeding brought to enforce this indemnification provision. Unless ordered by a court, any indemnification permitted under this Section shall be made after (a) determining that the indemnification is proper under the circumstances because the person to be indemnified has met the applicable standard of conduct and, (b) evaluating the reasonableness of the expenses, and of the amounts paid in settlement. No indemnification shall be provided for in connection with (a) the receipt of a financial benefit to which the person is not entitled, or (b) a knowing violation of the law.

ARTICLE XII - LIABILITY

<u>Liability of Directors</u>. No director or officer of the Corporation shall be personally responsible to its creditor for any indebtedness or liability and any and all creditors shall look only to the Corporation's assets for payment. Further, neither any officer, the Board nor any of its individual members shall be liable for acts, neglects, or defaults of an employee, agent or representative selected with reasonable care, nor for anything the same may do or refrain from doing in good faith.

ARTICLE XIII - RESTRICTIONS ON ACTIVITIES

No part of the net earnings of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributed to, its Directors, Officers, or other private persons, except that the Corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments or distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth herein. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be for the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation. The Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provisions of these By-Laws, no Director, Officer, employee or agent, or any other representative of the Corporation shall take any action or carry on any activity by or on behalf of the Corporation that is not permitted to be taken by an organization exempt under 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as it now exists or may hereafter be amended, or any corresponding section of any future tax code.

ARTICLE XIV -CONFLICT OF INTEREST

No person who is a Director, Officer or administrative employee of the Corporation shall undertake, continue or maintain any personal or business interest which is in conflict with or adverse to the interests or activities of the Corporation, except to the extent that such Director, Officer, or administrative employee has, in good faith, fully disclosed in writing to the Board of Directors or its designated executive committee the nature and circumstances of such personal or business interest, and received approval thereof. Any possible conflict of interest on the part of any Officer of the Corporation, member of the Board of Directors, or any member of the administration with the authority to act over others, shall be disclosed to the Board of Directors and made a matter of record.

Any Director having a possible conflict of interest on any matter before the Board shall not vote nor use his or her personal influence on any vote. The minutes of the meeting shall reflect that a disclosure was made and that the member abstained from voting.

The foregoing requirements shall not be construed as preventing the governing Board member from briefly stating his or her position or from answering pertinent questions from other members of the Board.

All persons subject to this Article shall be advised of this Article before entering on the duties of the office.


